The proposed monoraf system, patterned after the system that has been operating so successfully in Germany, is to be one of the fea-tures of the development of the 16, 900-acre Palos Vordes ranch, it was learned yesterday through a letter from Mr. Lowis to a prominent LoS Angeles Harbor citizen. The project will cost \$,000,000. Mr. Lewis's plan, his letter said; will provide for direct service from a point in the business section of Los Angeles to a terminal on the ranch, where provisions have been made to offer a sile for the estab-lishment of a brench of the Uni-versity of California, a \$1,000-600 hotel and 'other vast proj-ects. A branch of the monorali line will run from the Palos Verdes terminal to the heart of the harbor section, his letter states. "We are contemplating the con-struction of an overhead monorali fast line direct from downtown Los Angeles to the Palos Verdes estate. with a branch to Los Angeles Har-bor," the letter says. "This will give about a sit to eight-minute errois, sta to eight-minute section, his letter says. "This will sever do the harbor and Palos Verdes, as there would be no grade (rossings, the German overhead monoral system being employed. "It will be an atpress service with practically no stops between downtown Los Angeles Har-bor, it he sis undertaken," the let-ier continues, "It would figure in the cost of construction of the Palos Verdes improvements and added against the foot frontage. The cost is about \$3,000,000. It would prove a quicker service to Palos 'Verdes than any other residential section of Los Angeles, and You can appreciate what that will mean."
