Opposition Develops on Monorail

Route Alignments of Proposed Systems Criticized by Group

Some opposition has de veloped in the Metropolitan Transit Authority's initial attempt to determine official government policy route alignments for two proposed monorail systems here.

Supervisor Ernest E. Debs said he would not give a "blank check" to the MTA for rights-of-way for Alweg and Goodell monorail routes.

At the same time, other board members expressed their opposition to any piece-meal solution to the rapid

meal solution to the rapid transit problem here. This was an obvious refer-ence to Goodell's proposal to build a 17-mile "specialized" monorail line linking down-town Los Angeles and Inter-national Airport.

MTA Request

The supervisors' comm were prompted by an MTA request that the board consider the use of public rights-of-way as a step toward development of Alweg's 43-mile system and Goodell's downtown-airport line.

The request was forwarded to L. S. Hollinger, the county's chief administrative officer, County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy, the Regional Planning Commission and the road commissioner for study.

Goodell has since submitted an expanded proposal to the MTA. It would call for a 60-mile rapid transit system using suspended

monorail cars operating on lines running to Westwood, El Monte, Van Nuys and the

airport.
San Gabriel's City Council notified the MTA that it is opposed to the use of Valley Blvd. for the line's east leg.

"The basic route proposed
down Valley Blvd. is not
acceptable," said William J.
Probert, San Gabriel's chief
administrative officer. "The City Council and the citizens of our community, however, do believe that a rapid transit system would be of value to the Los Angeles Metropolitan Area." Metropolitan Area.

El Monte Approves

El Monte, in another com-munication to MTA, said it endorses "in principle" the Alweg proposal. El Monte would be at the eastern terminus of the San Gabriel

valley leg.

The MTA received protests from Mrs. E. Lester Cutting, president of Ebell of Los Angeles, and a board member of the Fremont Place

Assn.

Both Ebell and Fremont
Place are located in a section
of the Wilshire district of the Wilshire district where the Alweg monorail would run.
