CONSTRUCTION BEGINS FOR I-110/I-405 INTERCHANGE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT IN SOUTH BAY

TORRANCE— The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) today announced that construction has begun on the Harbor Freeway (I-110) and San Diego Freeway (I-405) interchange to ease traffic congestion for approximately 275,000 motorists who travel it daily.

At the groundbreaking event held today, Caltrans District 7 Director Carrie Bowen said, “Once completed, improvements at the I-110/I-405 interchange will ease congestion, decrease commute times, and increase safety on this critical inter-regional artery that serves not only the South Bay, but also visitors and businesses throughout Southern California.”

The \$35 million I-110/I-405 interchange improvement project will widen the northbound San Diego Freeway connector to southbound Harbor Freeway. A new auxiliary lane will also be constructed from the I-110/I-405 interchange to Del Amo Boulevard. Construction is anticipated to be completed in 2021.

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) provided seed funding for the project’s initial environmental work through its Measure R transportation sales tax that was approved by voters in 2008.

“Traffic is a thief — stealing time that could be spent with our loved ones and money from our economy that could go into greater productivity,” said L.A. Mayor and Metro Board Chair Eric Garcetti. “This highway improvement eases congestion at one of our most congested interchanges, letting Angelenos spend less time in gridlock and more time at their homes, on the job, and with their families.”

Caltrans and its federal and local transportation partners are investing billions in Los Angeles County in projects that will make driving safer, repair highways and bridges and reduce congestion on commuter and freight corridors.

Moreover, with the passage of the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (Senate Bill 1), \$54 billion will be invested over the next decade to fix transportation infrastructure across California. SB 1 funds will enable Caltrans to fix more than 17,000 lane miles of pavement, 500 bridges, and 55,000 culverts by 2027. Caltrans will also fix 7,700 traffic operating systems, like ramp meters, traffic cameras and electric highway message boards that help reduce highway congestion.

The contractor for the project is OHL USA, Inc. of Irvine, California.
