All right. We'll go ahead and get started. So I'd like to welcome you to this public hearing for the Los Angeles Aerial Rapid Transit Project Draft Environmental Impact Report. This project is proposed by Los Angeles Aerial Rapid Transit Technologies LLC. And thank you for taking time out of your day to participate in this meeting. I'm going to say a few words about language accommodations during the meeting, and as I do so, I just wanted to give you all a heads up that even if you're listening to the meeting in English, you're going to want to select English as I go through these instructions.

Item number one is the purpose of the meeting. Item number two is how to participate in this virtual meeting. Item number three is a general overview and introduction. And item number four is a sequel process overview. Then we'll move into the overview of the L.A. A.R.T. project and then an orientation to the draft EIR, Key analyses and conclusions and finally a public comment

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session and we'll provide more information about how to participate in the public comment session later in the meeting.

The meeting is scheduled to conclude around 7 p.m. And finally, if you need assistance with Zoom, please use the chat function or you can see up on the screen you can email mary.nooristani@aecom.com or call 6192519180 and we'll put that information in the chat for you. And I think there might have been one or two people that were reaching out about the interpretation so we'll have the team get in touch with you.

All right. So the purpose of this meeting is to inform the public about the draft Environmental Impact Report, key analyses and conclusions and to accept public comment on the draft EIR. And today's meeting is one of three public hearings being held during the draft EIR public review period. At today's meeting, you will have an opportunity to learn about the draft EIR, key analyses and conclusions, as I said, and you'll have an opportunity to provide public comment. Since the focus of the meeting is to provide an opportunity for verbal public comment, there won't be Q&A today.

And I want to note that during tonight's public comment session, we'll be taking verbal public comment, and communications typed into the Zoom chat will not be considered a formal public comment. But on the next slide, I'm going to look at all of the additional opportunities that there are to provide official public comment through January 17th, 2023.

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So let's take a look at the ways that you can comment on the draft EIR through January 17th. Our third public hearing will be held at Cathedral High School on Thursday, January 12th, from 5 to 7 p.m. And you can also comment via email, regular mail and phone, and we'll put that information in the chat for you. The phone number for providing official public comment through January 17th is 2139226913.

Okay. So how to participate in this meeting. When we get to the public comment session, you can raise your hand icon in Zoom by clicking on the hand icon or dialing star nine if you're calling in via phone. And you'll be called on to unmute yourself and provide public comment. A few notes about today's meeting. I wanted to reiterate that the last four meetings that were held in October, we had an opportunity for questions and answers.

However, today, because we will be focusing on public comment, there won't be any Q&A, it will be all public comment. And with that, I would now like to introduce Cory Zelmer, Deputy Executive, excuse me, Executive Officer with L.A. Metro.

Cory Zelmer: Thank you, Jessica. Good evening, everyone. I will start with a brief overview of the roles and responsibilities for [both] project and as Jessica already mentioned, the Los Angeles Area Rapid Transit Project is proposed by L.A. Aerial Rapid Transit Technologies LLC. Metro's role in the project is to serve as the lead agency for the preparation of an Environmental Impact Report, EIR are under the California Environmental Quality Act, or CEQA, for the draft.

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The EIR, which is out now for review, evaluated the potential environmental effects associated with both the construction and operation of the proposed project. As the lead agency, Metro has the responsibility to ensure that the EIR adequately assesses the potential project impacts of the proposed project, that the proposed mitigation measures to address the project impacts are appropriate and the CEQA process has been complied with for all public noticing, public outreach and the distribution of documents.

And as Jessica mentioned, we're currently accepting public comments on the draft, the EIR for CEQA, and she also went through a few of the ways you can provide comments, the public hearings that we're having tonight, in January by email, by mail, and also by phone, and we encourage you to make comments at any time that's convenient for you and to make comments as many times as you like up until the of the commentary.

Also as part of this project, we are utilizing Senate bill 44, which contains the CEQA process and was adopted last year to streamline judicial review for what are called environmental leadership transit projects in Los Angeles County.

Jessica: Cory, I'm going to ask that you speak up a little bit. It looks like we've got a couple of comments that came in that folks are having trouble hearing you.

Cory Zelmer: Sure.

Jessica: Thanks very much.

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Cory Zelmer: The proposed project would be the first in environmental leadership transit project under Senate Bill 44. As part of SB 44, there are several requirements related to two public meetings. The first requirement is to hold at least one informational workshop within the first ten calendar days of the public comment period to inform the public about the draft EIR, analyses and conclusions.

Cory Zelmer: The second requirement is to hold at least one public hearing within the last ten calendar days of the public comment period to obtain public testimony and comments on the draft EIR. Now transitioning to an overview of the CEQA process itself.

Jessica: Really quickly, Cory, I just want to interject. There were a couple of people that were saying they were having trouble hearing, so I wanted to provide a reminder that you're going to want to click on the globe icon at the, usually at the bottom of your screen and select whatever language you are listening to the meeting in. So if you're listening in English, you need to select English to preserve that audio for you.

Please go ahead. Cory. Sorry about the interruption.

Cory Zelmer: That's okay. So for CEQA.

CEQA is required for all projects undertaking funded or requiring approval by a public agency.

The process is intended to inform the public and decision-makers about the proposed project, to disclose any potential environmental impacts that may result from a

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proposed project and to provide multiple opportunities for the public to comment on environmental issues.

Typically with the CEQA process, there are two public comment periods.

The first is a scoping period which happens at the beginning of the CEQA process, and the second is a draft EIR public review period, which is what we're in currently. And also, as I mentioned, this project is utilizing SB 44, which has certain requirements related to the number and timing of public meetings during the draft EIR public review period.

So here's a timeline for the CEQA process and the preparation of the environmental impact reports. In the yellow box is where we are today. To the left of the yellow box are the activities that we've completed to date and to the right of the yellow box for activities we still have yet to complete. Starting on the far left, we started the CEQA process with what's called a notice of preparation, which was released in October of 2020.

The notice was intended to inform the public and agencies about Metro's intent to prepare an environmental impact report. The notice also started what is referred to as the public scoping period, which is the time allowed for the public and agencies to provide comments about the project and about the scope of the environmental impact report itself. During the public scoping period, we held a virtual open house from October 1st to November 16th, 2020, and a virtual scoping meeting on October 22nd. Following the public scoping period in June of 2021, we held a community information session which was intended to inform the public

about the project and any updates to the project since the start of the CEQA process.

We held a second round of community information sessions in October of this year where we informed the public about the upcoming release of the draft EIR and then as we mentioned, the EIR itself. The draft EIR was released on October 17th, which initially began a 60-day public review period, which we have since extended to 90 days, now concluding on January 17, 2023. After this public review period, the process includes preparing what's called a final environmental impact report.

In large part, it includes responses to all comments received during this period with the completion of the final EIR. We will then take it to the Metro Board for certification and project approval soon after followed by the filing of a notice of determination that the EIR process is complete and the project was approved by the lead agency.

In terms of the public meetings held during the draft EIR public review period, we held two informational workshops, both in October, which were intended to inform the public about the key analyses and conclusions in the draft EIR. We have also held one public hearing so far; tonight is the second of the public hearings, and we have a third and final public hearing scheduled for Tuesday, January 12.

And again the [inaudible] for tonight the third public hearing is to obtain public testimony from the public about the draft EIR. And with that, I'll turn it now to David Grannis to provide a project description.

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David Grannis: Thank you very much, Cory. My name is David Grannis and I'm a long-term transportation consultant for the project. I'm going to go through the project description. The project would provide the first permanent transit connection to Dodger Stadium. The travel time between Union Station and Dodger Stadium would be approximately 7 minutes for the 1.2-mile gondola ride. Up to 20% of fans could ride the gondola before and after each Dodger game. In addition to games and events at the stadium, the project would operate daily to serve existing residents, workers, park users and visitors to Los Angeles.

The project is zero-emission, environmentally-friendly rapid transit that would reduce greenhouse gas emissions as a result of reduced vehicle trips in and around Dodger Stadium and on neighborhoods, streets, arterial roadways and freeways. The graphic on this slide shows the project location and alignment. The project would commence adjacent to Union Station and El Pueblo and terminate at Dodger Stadium with an intermediate station at the southernmost entrance to the Los Angeles State Historic Park.

The project would connect surrounding communities of Chinatown Mission Junction, the Legion Park, Echo Park and Solano Canyon, as well as the Los Angeles State Historic Park to the regional transit system at Union Station. This slide shows several modern aerial transit systems which are feasible modes of urban transit operating in numerous cities around the world. Established [inaudible] transit systems worldwide, such as La Paz, Bolivia; Mexico City, Mexico are being used as rapid transit for urban populations that they serve.

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Similar to the systems used in Koblenz, Germany; Phu Quoc, Vietnam and Toulouse, France, the proposed project is a 3S gondola with cabins that carry approximately 30 to 40 passengers and offer a smooth, stable ride. As shown in the graphic on this slide. Pardon me. A gondola system includes passenger stations, a non-passenger junction, towers to support the aerial cables that carried the gondola cabins. The 3S system includes three cables. That's two track ropes for stability, to hold the cabins, and a third [haul] rope to circulate the cabins.

Cabins detach from the continuously circulating [haul] rope and slow down upon entering a station for passenger exit and entry. Then they re-attach to the [haul] rope. The cabins allow for sitting or standing. They're fully [ADA] accessible and provide room for baby strollers and bicycles. As to purpose and need, the project will be a first last mile connection between the regional transit system at Union Station and Dodger Stadium [at] Legion Park, which draws large regional crowds approximately 100 days per year.

The vast majority of visitors to Dodger Stadium drive their personal vehicles, creating congestion and associated emissions throughout the surrounding communities, which are identified as being in the 90th to 100th percentile of communities disproportionately burdened by multiple sources of pollution in the state. The Draft EIR identifies numerous project objectives, including reducing transportation-related pollution and greenhouse gas emissions as a result of reduced vehicle congestion, providing a sustainable form of transit with the use of

zero emission electricity and battery storage backup, enhancing safety in the neighborhoods around Dodger Stadium, identifying comparable, affordable and accessible fare opportunities, attracting new riders to the metro system.

The project alignment maximizes alignment along public rights of way and publicly owned property and minimizes aerial rights over private properties, taking into account existing and future adjacent land uses. The graphic on this slide shows the alignment primarily over public right of way and publicly owned property in teal. A national standard for roadways governing California by Cal OSHA regulates vertical and horizontal clearances between the roadway and cabins, the elements such as vehicles, pedestrians, vegetation, buildings and other structures.

The project's design goal is to develop a common architectural design that unifies the overall aerial gondola system, while allowing for each component to contribute to the respective localized urban conditions and conform with the surrounding urban environment. Of equal importance is the desire to minimize the perceived scale and mass of the stations, non-passenger junction and towers.

This slide shows the Alameda Station, which will be over Alameda Street adjacent to the planned Los Angeles Union Station forecourt and [inaudible]. The station stairs, elevators and escalators would be introduced on the west to the north of the [inaudible] in a proposed new pedestrian plaza at El Pueblo and on the east from the planned forecourt at Union Station.

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The Alameda Tower will be located on the Alameda Triangle, a city right of way between Alameda Street, North Main Street, and Alhambra Avenue. The project includes landscape and hardscape updates to the Alameda Triangle, including reuse and irrigation of existing pavers. In part the integration of existing pavers. The Alpine Tower will be located at the northeast corner of Alameda Street and Alpine Street, adjacent to the elevated metro L or Gold mine.

This site is a city-owned parcel currently being used as non-public parking storage for city vehicles. The Chinatown State Park Station will be located adjacent to Spring Street in the southernmost portion of the Los Angeles State Historic Park. The southern portion is located on city right of way, and the northern portion is integrated into the southern boundary of the park.

The project would integrate the park's granite pavers. Station amenities include a mobility hub where passengers would be able to access a suite of first and last-mile multi-modal options such as a bike share program, as well as pedestrian improvements, including hardscape and landscape improvements, shade structures and potential seating. The project also proposes park amenities, including concessions and restrooms.

The Broadway Junction is a non-passenger junction that would be located at the intersection of North Broadway and Bishop's Road. The junction will turn the alignment and cabins up toward Dodger Stadium. Stadium Tower will be located on Hillside private property north of Stadium Way between the Dodger Stadium, downtown gate and State Route

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110 to carry the cabins over state Route 110 and to Dodger Stadium.

The Dodger Stadium Station will be located at the southeast portion of the Dodger Stadium property near the downtown gate. Cabins at this station would arrive and depart from an [inaudible] boarding platform. One Dodger Stadium station would also include a pedestrian connection to Dodger Stadium, including hardscape and landscape improvements and potential seating. This station would include a subterranean area below the platform for storage and maintenance of cabins.

The project would provide a sustainable high capacity, zero-emission aerial rapid transit option for visitors to Dodger Stadium, while also providing access between Dodger Stadium, the surrounding communities and the regional transit system accessible at Union Station.

Gondola technology is quiet, and the project would reduce vehicle miles traveled and congestion, leading to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improved air quality.

The Draft Environmental Impact Report includes detailed construction assumptions and analysis, including the timeline. Project construction is anticipated to take approximately 25 months, working hours construction equipment, the number of construction jobs, temporary lane closures. The project would implement a construction traffic management plan that would include detours and ensure emergency access is maintained throughout all construction activities. And thank you very much.

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With that, I'll turn it over to D.J. Allison with AECOM, who will go through the draft EIR's key analyses and conclusions.

D.J. Allison: Thank you, David. My name is D.J. Allison. I'm a member of the CEQA EIR team, and I'm going to be presenting on the CEQA draft analysis and conclusions today. We're going to be going, we're now going to move into the draft EIR, key analyses and conclusions. We want to note that we have included quite a bit of detail. Can you go back a few slides there? We have included quite a bit of detail on these slides to be able to summarize the key analyses and conclusions of the draft EIR. In the interest of time, we're not going to read through the full content of each slide.

Instead, this portion of the PowerPoint will provide a summary of the draft EIR's analysis and conclusions. For those who would like to review the content of the PowerPoint in more detail, you may download it, download the PowerPoint from Metro's web page. I also believe links to the PowerPoint have been put in the chat of today's meeting. All environmental resource topics, CEQA quidelines Appendix G are addressed in the draft EIR.

Next slide. The esthetics analysis concludes that the project would not significantly impact visual character in its urban environment, significantly block scenic views, including that of the downtown skyline from the Los Angeles State Historic Park, or create a substantial source of light or glare. Impacts to esthetics would be less than significant. Agriculture and forestry. While the Dodger Stadium property has agricultural zoning, the property does

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not contain agricultural uses and is subject to a conditional use permit which allows for the operation of a major league baseball stadium and ancillary structures and uses including mass transportation service. Impacts to agriculture and forestry would be less than significant.

The air quality analysis concludes that impacts would be less than significant because 1) project construction emissions would be less than significant, would be less than the significance thresholds for pollutants and emissions, and the project would result in a net reduction in criteria pollutant emissions by reducing vehicle miles traveled and thereby decreasing emissions compared to existing conditions.

To minimize impacts off-road diesel powered and construction equipment greater than 50 horsepower must meet tier four emission standards for non-road diesel engines. The biological resources analysis concludes that the project area generally does not 1) provide a habitat for special status species or 2) contain riparian habitat or other sensitive natural communities or protected wetlands, or 3) serve as a regional wildlife corridor. The project would implement pre-construction nesting surveys and measures to avoid and minimize impacts to bats and nesting birds during construction.

The project would replace removed trees pursuant to the trees to the city's native tree protection ordinance and other applicable requirements. Finally, impacts to biological resources would be less than significant, with mitigation incorporated. The cultural resources analysis included analysis of potential impacts to build historic

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resources within the area of potential impacts, which includes Los Angeles Union Station Passenger Terminal and Grounds, Los Angeles Plaza Historic District, Cathedral High School and Arroyo Seco Parkway Historic District.

Potential impacts from ground disturbance to archeological resources within the area of direct impacts, including [inaudible] and Southern Pacific Railroad Station. To minimize impacts to cultural resources, the project would implement 1) project design features for pre and post construction documentation and protection of the winery and El [inaudible] mural, as well as protection of the mural during construction and 2) vibration monitoring and restrictions on force-adjustable ground compaction devices during Alameda stations construction.

To minimize impacts archeological resources, the project would implement 1) a cultural resources monitoring and mitigation plan and archeological resources worker implementation program, 2) a pre-construction archeological testing plan for the Alameda Station and Chinatown State Park Station and 3) potentially redesign of the Los Angeles State Park amenities to avoid archeological resources. Impacts to cultural resources would be less than significant, with mitigation incorporated. The energy analysis concludes that impacts would be less than significant because 1) temporary energy consumption associated with the project construction would allow for a long-term reduction in energy consumption associated with project operations.

And 2) the project would reduce vehicle miles traveled and increase the number of people using public

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transit, resulting in decreased use of fossil fuels. Geology and soils analyzed seismic hazards, unstable geology and expansive soils. This section also analyzed the potential for project construction to destroy unique paleontological resources. With implementation of a site-specific final geotechnical report, impacts to geology and soils would be less than significant with mitigation.

The northern portion of the project has the potential to encounter paleontological resources. However, impacts would be mitigated to less than significant with compliance with a paleontological resources monitoring and mitigation plan. The greenhouse gas analysis concludes that impacts would be less than significant. The project would not result in an incremental contribution of greenhouse gas emissions and would reduce greenhouse gas emissions compared to existing conditions.

The lifetime emissions of the project would result in a reduction of approximately 166,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases. Hazards and hazardous materials. The hazards analysis assessed project activities to determine their potential impact on creating conditions hazardous to the public or the environment during construction and operation of the project. With implementation of a soil and groundwater management plan, which would specify methods for handling and disposal of hazardous materials in the event that contaminated groundwater or soil are encountered during construction impacts would be less than significant with mitigation.

Construction of the project would not substantially impair or physically interfere with an

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adopted emergency response plan or emergency evacuation plan. Finally, the operation of the project would not affect emergency response. The hydrology and water quality analysis concludes that, 1) the project would comply with all applicable water quality protection laws and regulations and water quality control and sustainable groundwater management plans, and 2) the project would incorporate best management practices and implement lowimpact development plans.

Impacts to hydrology and water quality would be less than significant. The land use and planning analysis concludes that through temporary closures during [inaudible] temporary closures during construction would disrupt vehicular pedestrian and bicycle access. There would be a variety of options available for connections and access within the project area that would prevent closures from physically dividing established communities.

The project would enhance community connectivity by providing first and last-mile transit and pedestrian access enhancements. The project is consistent with policies, regulations, goals and objectives of all applicable plans, codes and ordinances. State Parks considers there to be an inconsistency between the project in the Los Angeles State Historic Park general plan and therefore a potentially significant impact because the general plan does not identify transit as a use for the park.

With the implementation of mitigation measure LUP-A which would require the project to obtain a general plan amendment, impacts would be less than significant. The

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project would have no impacts to mineral resources. Noise and Vibration. The noise analysis concludes that the project's significant and unavoidable on-site construction noise impacts would be a function of the noise generated by construction equipment, the location of the equipment, the timing and duration of the noise generated in construction activities and the relative distance to noise sensitive receptors.

Noise from offsite construction-related traffic would be less than significant, and noise from project operations would be lessened. The vibration analysis concluded that vibration generated from on-site construction activity would have significant and unavoidable human annoyance impacts. Potential building damage impacts during construction would be less than significant with mitigation and vibration generated from project operations would be less than significant.

The project will implement a construction noise management plan, including noise barriers, equipment maintenance and community outreach, including a noise disturbance coordinator with placement of vibration monitoring equipment for the Avalon Adobe, the 1970s edition, the [inaudible] mural and the winery, as well as restrictions on the use of force adjustable ground compaction devices during construction of the [Alameda] Station. Potential building damage would be less than significant.

The population and housing analysis concludes that impacts could be less than significant because, as a first and last-mile transit connection to Dodger Stadium,

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the project would not induce substantial population growth either directly or indirectly, and the project would not displace existing people or housing. The public services analysis concludes that while project construction and operation would create an increased demand for emergency services, the project would not create an additional demand that would result in the need to add any new or physically alter any existing public facilities.

The Los Angeles Fire Department and the Los Angeles Police Department would have adequate access during project construction. The project does not include housing, so would not increase demand for school services or other public facilities. With the implementation of the Traffic Construction Traffic Management Plan, impacts related to emergency access would be less than significant, with mitigation incorporated.

The Parks and Recreation Analysis studied the potential to impact parks during construction and operation, including Los Angeles Plaza Park, and [inaudible], Los Angeles State Historic Park and Elysian Park. The project would not increase the demand for parks, such that substantial deterioration of parks would occur or be accelerated. Impacts to parks and recreation would be less than significant.

The transportation analysis utilized both the CEQA guidelines and the city's transportation assessment guidelines. The analysis of vehicle miles traveled for the project employed a variety of data, methodologies and models in order to estimate project ridership, vehicle trips reduced vehicle trip length, and ultimately the

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vehicle miles traveled. Benefit of the proposed project Ridership estimates are provided for Dodger Stadium game and event attendees, employees, tourists, neighborhood riders and Los Angeles [inaudible] for park visitors and event attendees.

The lifetime vehicle miles traveled reduction for the project would be approximately 130 million miles traveled. The project would have no impacts to vehicle miles traveled. The project would have less than significant transportation impacts during construction, with implementation of a city-approved 1) construction traffic management plan, including street closure information, detour plans, [inaudible], and 2) a temporary disaster route plan, which would include street closure information and detour plans in order to facilitate the movement of emergency vehicles.

The project would implement visibility enhancements at the Alameda Tower and Chinatown State Park Station to reduce potentially unsafe physical conditions to less than significant with mitigation.

Tribal Cultural Resources. The draft EIR analyzes potential substantial adverse changes to significant tribal or cultural resources. Metro consulted with eight California Native American tribes pursuant to Assembly Bill 52. During construction of the Alameda Station, the project will 1) implement a cultural resources monitoring and mitigation program and archeological testing plan for the planned Los Angeles Union Station forecourt and 2) retain a Native American monitor to monitor ground disturbing

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construction activities at the location of the Alameda Station.

Impacts to tribal resources are less than significant with mitigation.

The utilities analysis concludes that construction of the project would require relocation of existing utilities, which would be coordinated with utility providers and conducted in compliance with the applicable codes and regulations. Existing utilities would be sufficient for project operations. To minimize the potential interference with existing utilities associated with utility relocations, the project would implement a utility relocation plan. Impacts to utilities and service systems would be less than significant with mitigation.

Wildfire. The portion of the alignment containing the Broadway Junction Stadium Tower and Dodger Stadium Station are classified as being within a very high fire hazard severity zone. The wildfire analysis concludes that construction and operation of the project would not inhibit access to identify disaster routes and would not substantially impair implementation of an emergency response or evacuation plan. The project would adhere to applicable codes and regulations and best construction practices and would not exacerbate existing wildfire risks.

Implementation of project design features, including a fire protection plan and a fuel modification zone surrounding the stadium tower construction site would further reduce these risks. Impacts to wildfire would be less than significant. Alternatives. The draft EIR includes analysis of three alternatives. First, the no project

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alternative. Second, the Spring Street alignment alternative. And third, the transportation systems management alternative, which is an enhanced Union Station, Dodger Stadium express service.

The no project alternative and the transportation systems management alternative would not improve connectivity for the surrounding communities or provide the same reduction of vehicle miles traveled, greenhouse gas emissions or improved air quality as the proposed project. The transportation systems management alternative would be considered the environmentally superior alternative because it would not result in a [inaudible] determination of a significant and unavoidable impact and would result in the fewest environmental impacts overall.

However, the transportation systems management alternative's impact would be greater for air quality energy, greenhouse gases, hydrology and water quality and transportation. But the transportation systems management alternative would not meet the majority of the project's objectives. The draft EIR includes analysis of Los Angeles State Historic Park usage. Due to the location of the proposed project alignment, which traverses over the western edge of the park adjacent to the metro [L] line and pedestrian pathway, the project does not significantly reduce the safe high-flying area within the park.

Due to the location of the proposed project alignment, which crosses over a portion of the park not typically used for screens and stages and because events can take place under the majority of the project alignment,

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the project does not significantly reduce the event space available within the park.

The draft EIR includes an airspace evaluation of heliports in the project vicinity, which concludes that the project will be clear of the airspace associated with the existing heliports and will not result in impacts to heliports in the project's vicinity. Design Option A The draft EIR includes analysis of project variations as design use options, which are included in response to stakeholder feedback.

Design Option A shifts the alignment between the Broadway Junction and Dodger Stadium Station to avoid the area rights over 451 East Savoy Street. This design option would result in additional utility relocations and construction durations. Design Option B analyzes the potential for a single tower along Alameda Street, which results in the removal of the Alpine Tower and a 50-foot overall height increase at the Alameda Tower.

The tall Alameda Tower has potential technical constraints and would potentially result in the need for additional private aerial rights. Design Option C analyzes a taller Chinatown State Park Station, which would result in additional construction activities and has the potential to reduce the passenger experience. Use Option D substitutes a non-passenger junction for the proposed Chinatown Park Station. This use option would have the same height, location, width, length and architectural finish as the project, but would not enhance community connectivity to the park, Chinatown and the Mission Junction Neighborhood.

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Finally, Design and Use Option E analyzes the [inaudible] Americans with Disabilities Act accessible pedestrian and bicycle bridge that would provide safe access between the Chinatown, Savoy and Solano Canyon communities in the park. I'm now going to turn it over to Michael Kennedy to provide an overview of the project's [parking site].

Michael Kennedy: Thank you. Thanks. Good evening. I'm Michael Kennedy with [inaudible]. I'm going to share the key findings of the project's parking study. Parking analysis is not required for the EIR but was of key interest to Metro, the city and the community. Metro conducted a peer review of the study and it has been available on Metro's website for review. While our ridership modeling and data indicate that most riders will take transit to get to the project as Dodger Stadium Express riders do today, some riders will choose to drive and park.

The parking study counted all publicly available spaces in parking lots and garages and all on-street spaces within a half-mile walking distance of the Alameda and Chinatown State Park Stations. Nearly 10,300 parking spaces were counted. Next slide, please. Of those 10,300 spaces, nearly 6,900 of them are in publicly available off-street lots and garages.

On the Dodger game day when the study was conducted, Dodger Stadium had a paid attendance of over 48,000, which is higher than the 2019 season average for weekday evenings. The study found that a bit less than 2,200 vehicles were parked and over 4,700 spaces were

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vacant in those off-street lots and garages. Since the study was conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic, we used historic data to develop an adjustment factor that we reviewed with Metro and L.A. DOT to estimate pre-pandemic conditions.

Based on the peer-reviewed ridership forecasting model and data for the projects, we forecast between 307 and 790 vehicles are expected to park around project stations on game days. With the addition of this peak project-related demand, all of those vehicles can be accommodated in off-street lobbies and garages, and there would still be over 3,900 spaces remaining.

There's plenty of off-street parking capacity, even if future developments are constructed on some of those parking lots. While the project will work to ensure that as many people as reasonably possible take transit to connect to the system, a parking management plan will be finalized before project operation to ensure that riders will park where they will be welcome and are discouraged from parking where they are not.

Strategies such as business-to-business partnerships to pre-sell bundle packages that include off-street parking and patronage at a local restaurant are one example strategy under consideration. Through the preparation of the parking management plan, the project team will work with L.A. duty to support the implementation and expansion of on-street parking management strategies. Example strategies include adjusting time limit and parking meter hours during Dodger games to encourage riders, discourage riders rather, from parking in the community.

Laura Adelman: No problem. Just getting started with those instructions. I'll let you, I'll let you pick up.

Jessica: Okay, great. Thank you. So apologies, everyone. So there will be a two-minute time limit for comment, just as we had at the in-person hearing recently. And we'll ask you to stay and spell your first and last name as you begin your comment. Once you have identified yourself, we will start the two-minute clock and you can provide your comment. If you exceed your 2 minutes, we will interrupt you and thank you for your comment and will encourage you to provide any further comment at a future hearing. I am in full support of this project for a variety of reasons, but to keep it short, the most pressing and urgent to me is the air quality for the beautiful community surrounding the stadium.

[inaudible] deserves a better scenario than they're currently enduring. I also love the opportunity for Dodger Stadium to become more accessible and available from other Southern California [inaudible] from Union Station.

And so I think it's a beautiful project. I'm very proud of

Chris Wilson: Good evening. My name is Chris Wilson with the Los Angeles County Business Federation. This is in full support of this project as proposed. LA ART will provide the first public transit connection to Dodger Stadium, which has the highest attendance out of any stadium in the country and is one of the few without a dedicated transit connection. It will improve traffic and parking for residents by potentially removing up to 3,000 car trips from neighborhood streets, easing local traffic, improving safety and reducing the need to park in the local community.

Security management of cues and crowd control are hardly discussed at maximum capacity. People could have to wait in line for 1 to 2 hours, and you're relying on a magical ticket reservation system to even out the crowds. You need to explain how that works.

I don't even have time to get into the flight from advertisements constantly streaming over our neighborhoods.

There's also cutting down 50-foot trees and oak trees in the park. And this faulty parking study that includes a lot of parking that isn't even open until, such as parking at the state park, which closes at sunset. So how are people going to get their cars out of the state park parking lot? And then also, I want to say that the pedestrian bridge into the park from Broadway, it shouldn't be held hostage to this project.

Of course, you want the bridge, you don't want the bridge to be held hostage.

And then I think an option to get to Dodger Stadium is all fine and good, but not when it sucks away resources from all other options that we're not even discussing. This would be a tourist trap. There should be additional studies. The Dodger Stadium Express from other locations, such as Pasadena.

Although the tramway was opened in 1976 in July it was intended to be just temporary transportation while the subway was getting connected. And then the subway fell behind schedule and it became a permanent fixture.

But in the 50 years it was in existence, it was only moved 26 million people while the subway moved millions a day, billions of people since. And then when the subway was completed in 1989, ridership drastically went down. So as a historian and documentary filmmaker, I've studied the impacts of public policy and transport policies on community [inaudible].

Chinatown's historically suffered from being moved already, past harassment and a past massacre perpetrated by non-Chinese. In the past, China and the US. California looks like.

There's not enough time really to address the countless reasons that this is a bad idea. Even if I didn't live in the neighborhood, I'd still be against this project. I'm all for environmental protection and for business people to do well and to be successful. But this whole project is built on a lie. It's not about saving the environment, but about increasing the fortunes of a billionaire.

There's no way that this project will be paid for by proponents or pay for itself, and taxpayers do not need to be put on the hook for this. There are other ways to reduce emissions. California's already on track to have automobiles become environmentally safer. If you live in the neighborhood, there's nothing environmentally friendly about this project. Rather, it's environmentally ruinous to everything it touches or is in its vicinity.

Problem number one is the claim that the gondola will have a traffic. However, based on the research done by the UCLA Mobility Lab, it only reduces traffic around the stadium by one percent on game nights, but it does significantly increase traffic in other areas.

Problem number two is the claim that the gondola will help reduce greenhouse emissions. However, the likelihood that people

I am literally directly opposite the Alpine Tower, and I'm at about 100, 125 feet in the air. So, I'm very glad to see, looking at the EID today -- EIR, I mean, that you are going to be above my head.

So, so I was quite concerned about

1 You're going to be 175 feet. By the way, 2 that drawing is very not to scale. 3 But I'm the daughter of a civil 4 engineer. My father was a mayor. First, the DEIR and the project have failed to adequately recognize the neighbors of this project who will bear the greatest brunt of its impact.

Second, the DEIR process has been flawed from beginning to end. It has been designed and carried out as a dog and pony show promoting the project and gaslighting neighbors about its true impacts. Neighbors have not been given adequate opportunities to participate, to

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be heard and listened to.

No wonder they made their voices heard at your last meeting. That is a tried and true method of environmental justice when authorities refused to enable authentic participation in the process.
