# GOVERNMENT RELATIONS: ELECTED OFFICIALS AND THE PECULIAR WORLD OF POLITICS



#### WHAT IT IS; WHO WE ARE

Since its creation in 1976, the Commission and its responsibilities have expanded significantly. It has been increasingly necessary to ensure that the Commission's programs and policies are known and understood by our local, state and federal elected officials. To meet this need, the Government Relations (GR) Section has continued to grow in duties in the last five years. The section continually attempts to find new and exciting ways to get our electeds interested in "rights-of-way", TIPS and concrete pours. Believe me, unless buses are driven through their offices it ain't easy, but we give it a shot.

Currently, GR has two professional staff and a very harassed, but hard working secretary/assistant. The section will fill a vacant GR rep. position by the end of August (please refer your friends to Jose). Mary Lou Echternach deals with the healthy egos of local elected officials and any transportation-related actions occurring in the local governments throughout the county. I am temporarily handling the ambitious and sensitive state and federal electeds and dealing with other legislative activities. I will share those duties with the new GR rep. come September. Mimi Gamez is our section's busy secretary and all around great person.



### WHAT WE DO

About 60-70 percent of the GR staff's time is spent writing (and why we don't have typewriters or personal computers is beyond me), researching and analyzing legislation and legislative issues (with the assistance of technical staff). Our primary responsibility is to report our findings and recommendations in this regard to the Commission's Intergovernmental Relations Committee and LACTC staff. You can think of us as legislative advisors and information brokers for the Commission. GR also provides direction for the LACTC consultants in Sacramento and Washington, D.C.

That brings me to our second most important and time-consuming function; the "relations" part of government relations. In order for us to work effectively for the Commission, we must continually establish and re-establish working relationships with elected officials and their staffs. We do that through a lot

of phone contact (Pacific Bell loves us), correspondence, one-on-one briefings, and joint meetings in the county and the capitols. We often initiate meetings; sometimes to talk about specific projects, sometimes just to keep the work of the Commission in the minds and hearts of the electeds. Therefore, it is vitally important that the section be clued-in to any and all contact other LACTC staff make with electeds and their staffs. We should have this information - drafts of letters, meeting dates, phone calls - prior to that contact. If that is not possible, we would like to know about the contact immediately after it occurs. You can imagine how embarrassing it would be (and has been) for GR staff and the Commission to learn about discussions on LACTC programs and projects from the elected official! When that happens, it appears that the right hand of the Commission doesn't know what the left is doing. Working as a unit will really allow all of us to do our job more effectively.

### HOW TO WORK AS A UNIT


Below are a few simple guidelines to follow which will help GR present the LACTC in the most favorable light to our electeds and meet the needs of our commissioners:

- 1. If you receive a request for information from an elected official's office (other than a commissioner), let GR know pronto. We should review the packet of info (if one is sent) prior to mailout. That way, we can avoid duplicating the material when we next meet with the studious politician.
- 2. Contact GR staff if you need to meet with any elected officials. It may be that we would want to attend such a meeting, or we may have some tips on the meeting participants and agenda.
- 3. Let GR know if you need information on legislation. Conversely, if you hear something hot about a particular bill, give us a call. All lobbying work will be handled by GR staff and consultants unless it is necessary to involve the technical experts.
- 4. And speaking of smoke-filled rooms, let GR know if you need anything from one of our consultants; Irv Smith in D.C. and Tim Egan in Sacto.
- 5. If you need to send a letter to an elected official, please, let GR review the draft and then send us a copy of the signed letter for our files.
- 6. Please sign out for, and promptly return, all Deering California Codes. The sign-out book is right next to the codes. Vee haf vays of making you comply wif dis requirement!

### OUR BEAUTIFUL GARFIELD BUILDING

When you walk through the lobby of the Garfield Building, you may wonder who is responsible for the careful restoration to its original 1928 splendor.

The owner, Peter Beale, is a well-known property developer who has lovingly restored treasured old buildings in Europe (where "old" can mean "several hundred years old"), on the east coast of the United States, and now in California.

The Garfield Building was the first property he bought in Los Angeles, about six years ago. The 12-story, 110,000 - gross-square-foot structure, was designed by architect Claud Beelman 60 years ago. According to the Los Angeles Conservancy, the building "exemplifies the transition from the Beaux Arts to the Art Deco styles."

(Mr. Beale also owns nearby Giannini Place, an historic building at Seventh and Olive that is enjoying an award-winning restoration. He is developing South Park with the South Park Consortium, as well. His daughter is an extremely active restorer and developer in her own right, and his son is a speed-racing champion in worldwide windsurfing.)

After the purchase of the Garfield Building, the entire lobby was redone; the "verde antique" marble walls cleaned, the twenty-foot ceiling repainted, the German silver picture-niche frames stripped and restored.

The chandeliers were taken down and stripped, redipped, and had their gold-leaf re-applied. The Art Deco elevator doors were cleaned; new elevator cabs were installed.


The Cultural Heritage Board of the Los Angeles Municipal Arts Department declared the lobby of the Garfield Building Historical Cultural Monument No. 121 in 1973. In 1982 it was admitted to the National Register of Historic Places, and it received a Preservation Award in 1986.

This structure, unique among restored downtown buildings, enjoys full occupancy. The lobby is on the Los Angeles Conservancy Art Deco walking tour (monthly, second Saturdays) and the Seventh Street "Mecca for Merchants" walking tour (fourth Saturdays). The information number at the Conservancy is (213) 623-CITY.

At one of the several ribbon-cuttings to honor the process of restoration, Mayor Tom Bradley told how the staunch old building had played a part in his life: when he was a child it was on his newspaper route; as a policeman it was on his beat; and as mayor he had the pleasure of opening it after the painstaking preservation and restoration.

The flag on the third-floor patio, matching one on Giannini Place, flies proudly over Eighth Street, celebrating life in our beautiful Garfield Building; we tenants salute you and appreciate you!



- 7. Requests for testimony before elected officials should be reviewed by GR. We have an extensive file of testimony.
- 8. If you are contemplati; ng a briefing or a major event with elected officials and their staffs, let us know plenty of time in advance.
- 9. If you need a bill run-off on the computer, please be patient. Just as in your section, GR has competing priorities. Besides, it takes a while for the legislation to print because we do not have a loser printer.
- 10. The IRC is the legislative arm of the Commission and GR is that committee's staff. If you want other LACTC committees to review legislation so that the Commission will have technical input on an issue, please work with GR. We will help you write the item (which must go to IRC if it is not just an update), we can check on the status of the bill, and we can tell you some things about the political players involved in the issue. The upshot is this; anything dealing with legislation should be reviewed and discussed with
