# AREA TEAM MEMBERS FEEL THE OF REORGANIZATION

The months of meetings, anxiety, excitement, and fear of the unknown for all those who were effected by the formation of Area

Teams are over. Now the 42 employees who serve on six teams are

dealing with the transition of changing job roles, mostly on a positive note, while others are left wringing their hands with left-overduties from their previous jobs.

Teammembers are in training to become "multimodal"— that means they will become experts in many aspects of transportation from bikeways and buses to commuter trains and traffic signals. "There's a lot of learning taking place. We didn't realize how much training would be involved.

Everyone's experiencing the same overwhelmed feeling," said Lupe Valdez, public process administrator for the San Gabriel Valley Team.

Besides the many meet-Ings and training sessions scheduled for team members, there's ageneral consensus among team staff that the new structure was a good move. "This is a more efficient way to serve the local entities," said Mary Lou Echternach, public process administrator for the Central Team. "With the Proposition A half-cent salestax, the 86 cities in the county are paying a lot for service. The area team structure allows us to give them the full service that they're paying for," she said.

Some teams members are



stressed about closing out their past projects while takingon a new load. "My expectations were raised about making the transition to a new job," said one worker. "Tve barely been able to dip my toes into my new job because two-thirds of my work is cleaning up old tasks."

All team members are dealing with the push/pull syndrome of going from departments to decentralized teams and having to give up their old projects. "The exchange of information and tasks has been the weakest link in the chain," said another employee. "But there are definitely benefits to being on a team. We are able to assist cities in a mutimodal sense and see a project all the way through."

"The teams give us a way to consolidate all information into one area. It saves time. reduces aggravation and is more productive. We see the whole picture, not only internally, but also for the people thatweserve,"saidRitaVega, project manager in the San Gabriel Valley team.

This year's new area team employees include Rex Gephari, Pat Holmberg, and Dale Royal.

**A**REA TEAM MEMBERS TAKE TO THE STREETS...

Team members will be out in their areas during September on a double mission. They will be conducting "environmental scans" and urging cities to designate the LACTC as the Congestion Management Program agency.

"An environmental scan is getting a profile of the area and a handle on its current transportation situation," said Pat McLaughlin, Area Team manager for the San Fernando Valley/North County. "We'll be researching what public transit currently exists and identifying all projects planned and funded for our cities." AT staff will talk to a variety of people, including some city managers and representatives from citizen groups and chambers of commerce. The results of their interviews and research will be shared with Commission members and cities, and later refined and developed for more indepth search and planning.

**AreaTeamsare** also briefing cities on the Congestion Management Program. The **CMP** was mandated by a bill tied to Proposition 111. It does three things: provides \$18.5 billion for constructing transportation facilities, changes the

way funds are distributed. and requires local agencies to work through a countywide Congestion Management Agency. Local cities have to pass a resolution designating

Area Team members went on the contract system in July. "It's valuable in the sense that each member knows what's expected of him or her," said Mary

> > "It's good to have goals and a working plan. I'm all for it, however the nature of this job is crisis-oriented. Our priorities change when

situations arise and the contracts have to be flexible to accommodate that," said Rita Vega, project manager on the San Gabriel team.

"The contract will be a

working document," said Caprice. "Employees will review the document every three months to take a look at their progress." FAST members should watch their in-baskets for notice of a training session on the new process set for September 14 from 9 a.m. to noon.

In some cases, Area Teams made the contracts a group exercise. In the Central Area team, led by Ralph de la Cruz, all members agreed on the philosophy and wrote into their contracts: "Before crossing the street, hold hands and look both ways."


## LEARNING THE ROPES IN LACTC'S FAST LANE . . .

#### RCC ROUNDING-UP NEW STAFF


Nowhere are growing pains more evident than in the Rail Construction Corporation. Now that Ed McSpedon has been

named president and CEO of the RCC, all other appointments are being made for the many upper management jobs and other positions. Many employees who have been acting managers are involved in the interview process. "There's been a lot of stress and nervousness around here lately," noted one RCC employee.


"An all-out effort is being made to accelerate hiring through local and nation-wide searches. Openings are in all areas from cost accounting and budgeting to engineering. About 68 positions are budgeted and recruitment and hiring may be a six-month process," according to Ramona Lopez in Human Resources.

Several people remain on the Blue Line project, wrapping up the Long Beach loop opening and the 7th and Flower streets station, while others have been cramming to learn the Metro Red Line projects. Expect to hear a lot of news about the draining of McArthur Park Lake for tunneling work in the area beginning in January. "I hate to think what's down there," bemoaned Robin McCarthy, RCC's public affairs manager. Meanwhile, the RCC public affairs department is out scouting areas for three field offices, to serve MOS I and II, and the Green Line. #### Film Reviews by Claudette A. Moody

Roberta says I have to be short and to the point on these reviews, so hold onto your hats, here we go!

#### Two Jakes -C

Talk about hype! The gossip surrounding the ten-year saga on bringing this story to the screen turns out to be more interesting than the movie. Jack Nicholson and the rest of the wonderful cast of professionals he has assembled couldn't quite bring off this slow, dull story. If Jake is

this slow, dull story. If Jake is such a great detective, how come he didn't figure out sooner that "Kitty" is a nickname for "Katherine?" Rent it.

#### Presumed Innocent — B-

Another great cast (almost) wasted. I knew who "done it" before I walked into the theatre and I haven't even read the book! The voice over at the beginning and end of the movie is stupid. The flick gets a B- on the strength of Paul Winfield's performance and Raul Julia's magnetism.

#### 'Mo Better Blues - B-

All regular readers of these reviews know I think Spike Lee is a film maker for the future. This is not his best effort. Good, but not great. The film needs a good trim (about 15 minutes or so), but it also could have dealt a little more with the motivation (both musically and romantically) for its main character, played by Denzel Washington. I give it a "B-"

because anyone as strikingly good looking and riveting on film as Washington deserves nothing less.

#### Ghost - B

This romantic/detective/spiritual film presents a nice little story of love that never dies, even when the main character does!

The detective part of it is pretty easy to figure out, and the spiritual concepts are solidly grounded in Judeo/Christian beliefs of good/evil -heaven/hell. Nevertheless, Moore and Swayze are an appealing couple, with and without clothes, and Whoopi Goldberg finally has a part that she can breath life into. If you want a sentimental, misty-eyed evening with a dose of comedy from Goldberg, see Ghost.

#### Dreams - C+

Kurasawa is an acknowledged Master of Cinema. In "Ran" he captured the most powerful battle scenes everfilmed. The Masterfalters with this indulgent piece based on recurring dreams he has had since he was a boy. (He is now in his eighties.) The series of nine vignettes are overly long and sometimes pointless. Catch his next movie, it is sure to be great.

#### My Blue Heaven - C-

Another waste of talent and my time. Rent this sucker. Or better yet, rent Steve Martin in "Roxanne" or "Parenthood." You'll enjoy those

movies a lot more.



## A Message From NEIL PETERSON

Recently I heard the staff record for longest commutes

into the office. Marney Ellis-Peek drives in from Lake Elsinore, while both Bart Kane and Genetha Eddins come in from Palmdale. A one-way commute for each of them is often more than an hour. The rest of us rush in on the average of a full 30 minutes and return home in about 40 minutes.

We are drowning in a sea of gridlock and choking on dirty air. But because you are a part of LACTC, you are part of the solution to the traffic congestion. I always emphasize to groups that I speak to that there is no one solution to the growing problem of traffic congestion and I let my audience know that the LACTC is doing everything possible to take immediate action on developing and implementing several plans to increase mobility.

Hot issues in front of us today are Proposition C— the proposition on the November Ballot to reduce congestion. It would raise the sales tax from six-and-a-half cents to seven cents and generate \$400 million a year for improved public transit. This measure will help to improve frequency, speed, and reliability of rail and bus service; facilitate flow of such service on streets and freeways; increase transit security and graffiti removal; and provide clean-air transit.

Something else you should know about is that we have joined forces with Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and San Diego counties to present a joint offer to purchase rights-of-way from the Santa Fe railroad company. These 225 miles rights-of-way are key to the future of commuter rail in the region. By acting together, these five counties are able to present a more attractive and fiscally responsible offer to the Santa Fe railroad company. In addition, we are continuing negotiations with Southern Pacific to purchase 175 miles of rights-of-way.

On another project, we are working with the Perini/DMJM/HSST joint venture to look at ways to develop a high-speed magnetic levitation (maglev) line between LAX and Palmdale. Travelling at speeds up to 100 mph, it would carry passengers across one of the most congested corridors in the Southern California area.

Your knowledge and involvement on these three hot issues, as well as your work on other projects, put you on the fast track to leading the way to greater mobility. Thank you for your hard work. You are doing a super job!






