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## Updated to Reflect More Board Member Participation Metro Board to Host Interactive Telephone Town Hall Meetings May 4-18

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) Board of Directors will host a series of live, interactive telephone town hall meetings May 4 through 18 to discuss Metro's draft expenditure plan for a possible November sales tax ballot measure. The plan includes a timeline and funding amounts for a number of transit, highway, pedestrian and bicycle projects over the next 40 years.

Residents across Los Angeles County will be called at random by an automated telephone system and invited to participate in the public forums from their homes. The telephone town hall meetings are another option for the public to provide input by May 20.

The plan outlines \$120 billion in transportation improvements with nearly 40 major projects to be built in 40 years. The draft plan also includes funding for commuter rail; transit operations; projects to keep buses, trains and facilities in good working condition; pedestrian and cycling connections, and; keeping fares affordable for students, seniors and the disabled. The plan would also return money to local cities for use on their transportation improvements.

"We've already received a significant amount of stakeholder feedback on Metro's draft expenditure plan that was unveiled in March," said Metro Board Chair and L.A. County Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas. "Now, we want to provide another round of opportunities to engage members of the public through a series of telephone town hall meetings. I encourage everyone interested in our county's transportation future to join the conversation."

Metro's Board of Directors will vote in June on the plan and decide whether to put the ballot measure before Los Angeles County voters in November. Public input will be compiled and shared with Board Members before their June decision.

Approximately 30,000 residents in areas served by each Metro Board Member will be called at random through the automated system and invited to participate in the telephone forum. When residents answer their phones, they will be connected to the meetings automatically. Anyone who does not receive a call but wants to participate can dial the toll-free telephone numbers listed below.

Metro is a multimodal transportation agency that is really three companies in one: a major operator that transports about 1.4 million boarding passengers on an average weekday on a fleet of 2,200 clean air buses and six rail lines, a major construction agency that oversees many bus, rail, highway and other mobility related building projects, and the lead transportation planning and programming agency for Los Angeles County. Overseeing one of the largest public works programs in America, Metro is changing the urban landscape of the Los Angeles region. Dozens of transit, highway and other mobility projects largely funded by Measure R are under construction or in the planning stages. These include five new rail lines, enhanced bus operations, and numerous highway and local projects.

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
