HISTORICAL/ARCHITECTURAL RESOURCES

INTRODUCTION

Existing Conditions

Methods and Techniques

Preliminary research for the cultural resource inventory of the RTD Metro Rail project determined which historic/architectural resources were known to exist within the areas of potential environmental impact (APEI), and identified resources that have not been previously noted. This preliminary research was achieved by:

- Consulting National, State and local registers for sites listed.
- Compiling information from cultural resource surveys that have been performed within the project area; such as surveys by the Hollywood Revitalization Committee, L.A. County Museum of Natural History, Community Redevelopment Agency (City of Los Angeles) and City of Los Angeles Bureau of Engineering.
- Contacting historical/architectural researchers who have, or are presently conducting research in the study area. Examples of these include the Los Angeles Conservancy, Los Angeles Cultural Heritage Board, Western History Research Center at the L.A. County Museum of Natural History, Hollywood Heritage, El Pueblo de Los Angeles State Historic Park, and numerous other institutions.

Actual field survey for the RTD Metro Rail project was performed on proposed station locations with their areas of potential environmental impact (APEI). APEIs were determined through consultation with RTD, the State Office of Historic Preservation (SHPO) and the Los Angeles Conservancy. Two hundred and ninety-five properties were surveyed and inventoried within the following twenty-six proposed station locations:

Field surveys were carried out on June 12-13, June 26-27, and November 17-19, 23-24 of 1982. The surveys were conducted on foot at each station location by both a historian and an architectural advisor. Historical and architectural data detailing information to be used to complete California Historic Resources Inventory forms (DPR 523) was collected for each noteworthy structure within the APEI. These forms include such detail as: property name and address, type of ownership, present use, previous use, architectural style and details, National Register status, significance and date of construction. (The forms are included in Part B of this appendix.)

Photography of the cultural resources within APEIs was performed by a professional photographer after completion of the field survey. Photographs of structures taken for the Historic Resource Inventory forms are contemporary $3-1/2 \times 5$ inches black-and-white glossy prints, delineating important architectural features.

Inventory Summary

Of the total 295 properties surveyed, 75 were considered historically significant and listed on or potentially eligible to the National Register (Table A). The remaining 220 properties were not considered potentially eligible to the National Register at this time. As it may be determined that these properties are significant in the future, brief inventory forms are provided for each property, and are included in Part B of this appendix.

Designation of eligibility of the historical resources to the National Register was determined through field survey, research and the following criteria for use on the State of California Historic Resources Inventory forms:

- 1. Individually listed on the National Register.
- 1D. Listed on the National Register as part of a district.
- 2. Determined individually eligible to the Register by the U.S. Department of the Interior.
- 2D. Determined eligible only as part of a district.

- 3. Appears eligible for individual listing.
- 3D. Appears eligible for listing only as a contributor to a potential National Register district.
- 4. May become eligible for listing when:
 - a) more historical or architectural research is performed.
 - b) the property is restored to an earlier appearance.
 - c) more significant examples of the property's architectural style are demolished.
 - d) the property becomes old enough to meet the Register's 50-year requirement.
- 4D. May become eligible (as above) only as a contributor to a district.
- 5. Is listed or is eligible for listing under a local preservation or landmark ordinance.
- 5D. Is listed or is eligible for listing as a contributor to a locally designated historic district or preservation area.
- 6. None of the above.
- 7. Has not been evaluated.

Survey Results

Of the 75 historically significant resources, 9 are listed on the National Register of Historic Places, either individually or as districts (1 or 1D). All of these resources are located in the downtown district or Wilshire district and include: Union Station, El Pueblo de Los Angeles, * Title Guarantee Building, Pershing Square Building, Broadway Mart Center, Myrick and Markham Hotels, Federal Title Building, Barker Brothers Building and the Pellissier Building (Table B).

Forty resources appear eligible for the National Register through survey and research (3 or 3D) (Table B). Twenty-five resources may become eligible for National Register listing when they meet the criteria indicated under Item 4 (Table B). One resource cannot be considered for National Register eligibility; the structure has been demolished.

In addition to field survey and research involving 26 proposed RTD stations, 4 of which have been cancelled, literature searches and windshield surveys were conducted for the

Special Alternatives Analysis in October and November of 1982. A windshield survey and literature search was performed for Hollywood along the three proposed Metro Rail routes (A-C); for North Hollywood along the alternatives (S-1 through S-4; N-1 through N-6); and a literature search was performed for the Hollywood Hills and portal locations. Historic/architectural resources were identified and assessed for potential impact by Metro Rail. The results of these studies appear in this appendix.

Field survey or research was not conducted on any non-station impact areas such as vent locations, cooling towers, portals, equipment storage areas, staging areas or parking lots unless the areas were included within a designated APEI.

POTENTIAL IMPACTS/EFFECTS

Potential Impacts

This section discusses potential impacts and effects of the RTD Metro Rail on parklands and historic/architectural resources within areas of potential environmental impact (APEI), in response to Federal laws.

Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 directs Federal agencies or Federally subsidized agencies to take into account the effect of their project on any district, site, structure or object that is included in the National Register of Historic Places. The 1970 amendments to the Act extend this consideration to properties that are eligible to the National Register. Federal agencies must obtain the review and comment of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation prior to the approval of projects which affect such properties. The Advisory Council, an independent agency created to advise the President and Congress on matters involving historic preservation, has established procedures for the protection of historic and cultural properties included in or eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (36 CFR Part 800).

Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act of 1966 (49 USC 1653 (f)) declares a national policy that special effort be made to preserve the natural beauty of the countryside, public park and recreation lands, wildlife and waterfowl refuges, and historic sites. Section 4(f) permits the Secretary of Transportation to approve a project that requires the use of publicly owned land from a park, recreation area, or wildlife refuge of national, state or local significance, or any land from a historic site of national, state or local significance only if the following determinations have been made: 1) there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use of such land; and 2) all possible planning has been undertaken to minimize harm to the 4(f) lands resulting from such use.

Potential impacts on cultural resources within the established APEIs have been identified in the following list. As cited in 36 CFR 800.32, a project or undertaking shall be considered to have an effect:

... whenever any condition of the undertaking causes or may cause any change, beneficial or adverse, in the quality of the historical, architectural, archaeological, or cultural characteristics that qualify the

property to meet the criteria of the National Register. An effect occurs when an undertaking changes the integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, or association of the property that contributes to its significance in accordance with the National Register criteria. An effect may be direct or indirect. Direct effects are caused by the undertaking and occur at the same time and place. Indirect effects include those caused by the undertaking that are later in time or farther removed in distance, but are still reasonably foreseeable. Such effects may include changes in the pattern of land use, population density or growth rate that may affect properties of historical, architectural, archaeological, or cultural significance.

As currently proposed, the project may have the following impacts or effects:

- Acquisition by the RTD and destruction of the resource outright or impairment of the resource through removal of all or a portion of the resource.
- Construction-related activities that may affect the structural or architectural integrity of buildings in proximity to station locations. These impacts include possible vibration or subsidence.
- Visual impact during construction or operational phases of Metro Rail.
- Future joint development as a result of Metro Rail construction. This potential impact is difficult to determine until more substantial plans are outlined. Potential effect may include alteration or impairment of resources, incompatible use, isolation of the resource from its surroundings, and outright destruction.

Of the 75 historical/architectural resources identified in the survey and research, 19 may be affected by acquisition (Table C). Implementation of RTD Metro Rail will require acquisition of land from the following four historic properties or parks under 4(f) regulations: Civic Center Court of Flags, Pershing Square, Hancock Park (La Brea Tar Pits), and Campo de Cahuenga, discussed in another section on 4(f). Twenty-five resources may be affected by construction-related impacts; 24 by visual impacts; and 4 by possible future joint development (Table C).

MITIGATION MEASURES (By impact or effect)

Without adequate mitigation of potential impacts or effects to significant resources it is possible that the proposed undertaking may have adverse effects. Adverse effect is defined in 36 CFR 800.3b in the following way:

... adverse effects on National Register or eligible properties may occur under conditions which include but are not limited to:

- (1) Destruction or alteration of all or part of a property;
- (2) Isolation from or alteration of the property's surrounding environmment;
- (3) Introduction of visual, audible, or atmospheric elements that are out of character with the property or alter its setting.
- (4) Neglect of a property resulting in its deterioration or destruction.
- (5) Transfer or sale of a property without adequate conditions or restrictions regarding preservation, maintenance, or use.

Given the above criteria of adverse effect, several methods of lessening or mitigating impacts to cultural resources are recommended below. In each case, the proposed mitigation measure will require review by government agencies and ultimately require preparation of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA). This MOA will stipulate the measures and actions necessary to "avoid, satisfactorily mitigate, or accept the adverse effects on the property" (36 CFR 800.6c). The MOA should be prepared to a level of specificity to ensure feasibility and applicability for both individual resources and districts.

Acquisition

....

- Redesign station location or alignment to avoid resource.
- Remove resource temporarily and replace in original location upon completion of construction.
- Remove resource to another location, preferably in a similar architectural setting, or incorporate in an interpretive park.
- If removal and destruction of resource cannot be avoided, document and photograph before removal. Any new structures to be built on the site should incorporate the original resource's architectural features in a compatible replication.

The measures recommended above will require impact specific review and consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer and reviewing agencies. To ensure a clear understanding of the level of mitigation required and the timing of such mitigation, a Programmatic Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the project proponents and reviewing agencies should be formulated.

- Construction-related activities (Vibration or subsidence)
 - Technical engineering measures should be taken to avoid impact.
 - Pre-certification of structures that may be affected; monitoring of structural vibration during construction.
 - Under-pinning of foundations to avoid subsidence.

Visual

- Every attempt should be made to incorporate the existing architectural motif or style of the surroundings into proposed station facilities, joint developments and other elements of the rail system.
- Street scapes and street furniture should not be obscured or segregated, they should be designed into the plans.

• Future Joint Development

- Incorporation of resource into planning to include use of existing architectural styles, building materials and visual quality.

HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

Introduction

The 18-6 mile proposed RTD rail line passes through several distinct communities in the Los Angeles area including Central City Los Angeles, Westlake, Wilshire, Hollywood, Universal City, and North Hollywood. Each community has experienced its own historic development, as reflected in its architecture. Together, the areas included in the RTD route represent the historical and architectural development of Los Angeles from its founding to the present day.

The southern portion of the route, beginning downtown in Los Angeles and then passing westward along Wilshire Boulevard to Fairfax Avenue, includes the earliest sections of Los Angeles. Prior to the arrival of Spaniards in Alta California, this area was inhabited and extensively used by the native Indians. The aboriginal village of Yangna was located in present-day downtown Los Angeles generally between Aliso and First Streets in the area of Alameda Street (Guinn 1902:42,60). Native-American trails from the village to the seashore, near present-day Santa Monica, roughly followed the route of Wilshire Boulevard (Hancock 1949:37-45). The trail passed La Brea tar pits, an area often frequented by Indians in search of game trapped in the asphalt pools (Martinez 1938:37).

Spanish and Mexican Period

In August 1769, the trail was used by a Spanish exploration party, under the command of Captain Gaspar de Portola, who traveled from the village of Yangna to La Brea tar pits

while enroute to Monterey and San Francisco. Records of the journey were the first written descriptions of the region (Guinn 1902:42; Constanso 1911:19-23).

The first Europeans to settle the present-day downtown region were 46 colonists who founded the Pueblo of Nuestra Senora la Reina de Los Angeles del Rio de Porciuncula on September 4, 1781. Established as an agricultural community to supply food for California's presidios, the town was laid out around a plaza located slightly northwest of the plaza that exists today (Chapman 1921:391-392; Bancroft 1884, Vol. I:337-351; Bean 1978:35-36). In 1902, historian J.M. Guinn noted:

The boundaries of the Plaza Vieja, or old plaza, as nearly as it is possible to locate them now (1902) are as follows: the southeast corner of Upper Main Street and Marchessault Street for the southern or southeast corner of the square; the east line of Upper Main from the above named corner, 100 varas, in a northerly direction for the east line of the square; the eastern line of New High Street for the western line of the square; and the northern line of Marchessault Street for the southern line of the square (1902:61).

By 1784, the colonists had built adobe houses and public buildings. Construction of an adobe church commenced and was completed 5 years later (Guinn 1902:61; Gleye et al. 1981:22). The population of the pueblo continued to grow. Most of the additional settlers were retired presidio soldiers. By 1791, the town's population had increased to 141 inhabitants divided among 30 families (Guinn 1902:62-63). By 1810, pueblo residents numbered 415 (Guinn 1902:63).

In 1815, a flood destroyed a new church that was under construction and the plaza was moved to its present location. The chapel at the new plaza (still in existence) was completed in 1822. That same year, the pueblo's population numbered 770 (Guinn 1902: 65; Gleye et al. 1981:23). The town continued to grow and by the end of the decade included some foreign residents. In 1828, the Yankee hide trader Alfred Robinson visited Los Angeles, noting:

The population of this town is about fifteen hundred; and has an alcalde, two regidores, and a syndico, who composes its "Ayuntamiento" or town council. In the vicinity are many vineyards and cornfields, and some fine gardens, crossed by beautiful streams of water. The land being level and fertile, is capable of great agricultural improvement; and several Americans, taking advantage of the resources of the place, are living here, having store houses, and are engaged in business (1846:25).

In 1834 the pueblo boundaries were fixed at two square leagues in each direction from the plaza center. The following year, Los Angeles was made the capital of Alta California (Guinn 1902:144).

Throughout the Spanish and Mexican periods, the Pueblo of Los Angeles remained a frontier settlement with crooked, irregular strets, house lots of various shapes and sizes, and houses constructed at different angles to the streets and plaza (Guinn 1902: 144). The town consisted entirely of adobe houses. Most were single-story structures with flat earthen roofs and dirt floors (Gleye et al. 1981:24; Cleland 1922: 312; Pattie 1831:278). The town's appearance and architecture remained unchanged until after the conquest of California by the United States.

American Period

Los Angeles was occupied by U.S. troops in 1846. From the late 1840s to 1860 a constant influx of American residents transformed the settlement from a Mexican village to an American frontier town. In 1847, the plaza was squared to correct its former erratic shape. Two years later, in 1849, the town was surveyed and regular blocks and streets laid out. On April 4 of the following year, Los Angeles was incorporated as a city by the provisional state legislature. Four days later, on April 9, a post office was opened (Guinn 1902:146-149). Several newspapers were established from 1850 to 1860 and included the Los Angeles Star, the Southern Californian, the Southern Vineyard, the Los Angeles News and El Clamor Publico (Guinn 1902:154). Population of the town in 1850 numbered 1610 inhabitants. By 1860 the number of residents had increased to 4399 (Guinn 1902:154-155).

In spite of the rapid growth and attempts by residents to regulate the location, size, and shape of streets and lots, Los Angeles in 1860 remained a frontier settlement of rambling dirt streets lined with adobe, brick and wooden structures. Architecture in the city was in a state of transition from that of an adobe pueblo to an American town of wood and brick buildings. Americans, arriving in Los Angeles during the early 1860s, imported their traditional wood and brick style architecture, which they preferred over the original Mexican adobe. Early in the decade, prefabricated wooden buildings were shipped to the West Coast from Boston. In 1851 a sawmill was established at San Bernardino and began to supply wood to city residents. The first bricks were fired in Los Angeles in 1852 (Gleye et al. 1981:43; Guinn 1902:154-155).

Even though brick and wooden buildings began to dominate the city landscape by the late 1850s, Mexican residents continued to build adobe structures. Adobes built after 1850, however, differed from the former single-story, flat-roofed dwellings of the Mexican period and were constructed in the two-story, peaked-roof Monterey tradition (Gleye et al. 1981:33-36).

The town's growth continued, and over the next two decades, from 1860 to 1880, Los Angeles evolved from a small frontier settlement into a city. By 1870 the community's population stood at 5164 (Guinn 1902:156). The late 1860s and early 1870s saw a population and building boom that entirely eradicated the city's Mexican and frontier appearance. By 1874, Los Angeles could boast a public library association; new school house; Catholic, Episcopalian, German Evangelist, Methodist and Congregationalist churches; and a Jewish synagogue. Local fraternal organizations included Odd Fellows, Masons, Red Men, Knights of Pythias, Good Templars, Sons of Temperance, and Champions of Red Cross. In addition, the city had two hospitals, a Catholic boys and girls school, and four local railroad lines (Truman 1874:17-19).

One visitor, Ben Truman, commented on the phenomenal transformation of the community:

I first visited Los Angeles in 1867. Crooked, unpaved streets; low, lean, rickety adobes houses, with flat asphaltum roofs; ...were the, then, most notable feature of this quandam Mexican town. But a wonderful change has come over the spirit of its dream, and Los Angeles is at present – at least to a great extent – an American city. Adobes have given away to elegant and substantial dwellings and stores; the customs of well regulated society have proved to be destructive elements in opposition to lawlessness and crime; industry and enterprise have now usurped the place of indolence and unproductiveness; The population at present is about 13,000 and is rapidly increasing (1874:27).

The economic depression of 1875 slowed city growth during the last half of the 1870s. Architecture during the period consisted of wooden and brick structures built in the Italianate style, which had been imported from the East around 1860. By the late 1870s, Italianate buildings dominated the metropolis (Gleye et al. 1981:44).

From 1880 to 1890, Los Angeles and southern California in general experienced one of the largest population booms in the Nation's history. In 1882, Los Angeles received a direct railroad connection with the East by way of San Bernardino. As a result, the city's population exploded from 11,183 in 1880 to over 50,000 10 years later (Guinn 1902:157; Gleye et al. 1981:49-50, 54). The "boom of the '80s" was characterized by unparalleled growth, and outrageous real estate speculation. It ended in an economic crash when the bottom fell out of the real estate market in 1888 (Cleland 1922:440-445). In its wake, the Boom left a large permanent population in southern California, and Los Angeles had been transformed from a small city into a major metropolis. Architecture during the boom years was dominated by Queen Anne and Victorian style buildings (Gleye et al. 1981:49-50, 54).

From 1890 until 1920, Los Angeles experienced a period of regular, steady growth. During this period the business district moved south, centering around Fourth and Broadway, and the residential area expanded. Between 1896 and 1899, the city area increased on the southwest and northeast, through annexation, from 27 to 37 square miles. Los Angeles residents numbered 102,298 by 1900 (Guinn 1902:158; Otis 1910). In 1906 a project was begun to bring water to the city from the Owens River valley (Guinn 1907:335).

Architecture during the turn-of-the-century varied. As the business district expanded, wooden and brick Italianate structures and small cottages were replaced by multi-story, concrete and steel Beaux Art buildings (Otis 1910; Gleye et al. 1981:99). The expanding residential areas included Craftsman Bungalow, Mission Revival, and Spanish Revival style homes (Gleye et al. 1981:49).

During the early 1920s, an oil boom and the movie industry increased publicity of southern California's climate, and the automobile started to bring people West in ever-increasing numbers. Growth in Los Angeles turned away from downtown and into

outlying areas as real estate speculators realized changes created in human mobility by the automobile (Gleye et al. 1981:115).

In 1921, developer A.W. Ross purchased 18 acres of land on Wilshire Boulevard midway between downtown Los Angeles and the beach. Ross's tract was located at the center of a circle 4 miles in diameter that included Hollywood, Beverly Hills, Westlake Park, and West Adams. Intending to develop a new commercial center, Ross had strategically purchased land within easy automobile access to the most affluent communities in the Los Angeles area. By the late 1920s, after a bitter zoning feud with downtown interests, the new development, known as the Miracle Mile, became a linear shopping district dominated by Art Deco structures. The buildings were designed to provide easy and convenient access for the automobile shoppers (Robinson 1965:2; Gleye et al. 1981:116).

The automobile affected building design in a number of ways. Large display windows were installed in order to make merchandise visible from the street. So that stores would be visible to auto-shoppers from a distance, tall cylindrical towers were often incorporated into the structure design. Large parking lots behind the stores became another added feature, and the main entrance was moved to the building's rear so that it faced the parking lot (Gleye et al. 1981:116-118).

The depression years of the 1930s were a period of slow growth. Commercial buildings constructed during the period continued to incorporate features adapted to the automobile shopper. Structures built during the latter part of the decade, especially along Wilshire Boulevard, featured Streamline Moderne style architecture popular during the period (Gleye 1981:129).

The Second World War drastically altered southern California, setting forces in motion that would make Los Angeles one of the fastest growing and largest cities in the nation. Vast amounts of government money spent on the development of defense industries in southern California resulted in a final overwhelming population boom that is still in progress (Bean 1978:359-360; Patterson 1975:312-313). Rapid growth was further stimulated in the 1940s and 1950s through construction of freeway systems that allowed development of residential suburbs away from centers of industry and the completion of the California and Colorado aqueducts, allowing the expansion of the region's population far beyond what local water supplies could maintain (Davies 1975:172). Architecture of the post war boom consisted of modern multi-story office buildings and residential tract houses (Gleye et al. 1981:148).

From the corner of Fairfax Avenue and Wilshire Boulevard, the RTD route passes northward through Hollywood, and across Cahuenga Pass to North Hollywood. During Los Angeles' early development, these areas were outlying agricultural regions. The area of present-day Hollywood was first homesteaded by American farmers in the 1860s (Palmer 1931:58-60). During the "boom of the '80s", the area was named Hollywoodland and subdivided. A small town gradually began to develop and by 1897 had its own newspaper and post office (Palmer 1937:73, 95, 99). The city of Hollywood was incorporated in 1903 (Palmer 1937:125). It was short-lived, however, for in 1910 the community was annexed by Los Angeles (Palmer 1937:178). The same year, the Nestor Film Company opened the first film studio in Hollywood, creating an industry that would bring the community world-wide fame and notoriety (Palmer 1937:191).

Present-day North Hollywood also had its origins in a small agricultural community. In the 1870s, the southerly half of San Fernando Valley was bought by Isaac Lankershim and I.N. Van Nuys for wheat ranching. By the 1880s the Lankershim/Van Nuys interests were operating six ranches through a corporation known as Los Angeles Farm and Milling Company. With the real estate boom of 1887-1888, 12,000 acres of the southern portion of the valley were sold to Lankershim Ranch Land and Water Company and were cut into 40-acre parcels. The community of Lankershim was developed at this time (Robinson 1972:6). In 1923, the community was annexed by Los Angeles and in 1927 the post office name was officially changed from Lankershim to North Hollywood (Hart 1942). Architecture of both communities during their development paralleled that of Los Angeles.

In addition to the cultural resource survey performed for the RTD Metro Rail station locations, several other types of surveys and analyses were also conducted for various alternatives along the line.

In October through November of 1982, a special analysis of alternative routes in both Hollywood and North Hollywood was performed. This analysis involved a literature search for sites previously recorded in the study area, and a windshield survey in which historical/architectural resources were noted and recorded. No further research or analysis of the buildings was involved. The sites noted are listed in Tables A and B.

Structures of historical or architectural significance in the Hollywood Hills were noted through a literature search. As the subway will be deep underground in this area, there is no expected impact to any structures on the surface. Because of property inaccessibility and poor visual access in the Hollywood Hills, it was not feasible to survey individual structures from ground level. A listing of structures noted through the literature search is included in Table C.

The vicinity of the Hollywood Hills in proposed RTD portal areas was analyzed through literature search and windshield survey; sites are included in listings in Tables A and B.

A special analysis of Whitley Heights National Register District was conducted for presentation to the public in November of 1982. The special analysis was performed because of concern for resources in the District, directly above the proposed subway route. The analysis involved a study of Whitley Heights as a National Register district, possible impacts by RTD and proposed mitigation measures. As a result of the study, RTD agreed to move the proposed line eastward, under Cahuenga Boulevard, avoiding any potential impact to Whitley Heights National Register District.
