Winners of the Safe Performance Award for the third quarter were Transportation Division 3216 and Maintenance Division 3305. Accepting on behalf of their divisions at the December 3 Board of Directors' Meeting, Division 16 Manager John Adams and Division 5 Luchus Smith were presented plaques and safety bonus checks of \$100 each by RTD President Jan Hall and General Manager John A. Dyer.

Division 5 has earned the Safe Performance Award once before, but what distinguishes this win is that the division

successfully reduced their lost time injuries by 67. percent from 7.9 per 100 thousand hours worked to 2.6 in the third quarter. The 2.6 reports are 5.9 reports per 100 thousand hours below the District goal of 8.5.

Maintenance Division 5 Luchus Smith has been with the District for 25 years and has been the division's manager for the last 7 years.

Transportation Division 16 reported a 49 percent decrease in lost time occupational injuries in the third quarter. They reduced injuries from 11.7 for each 100

County to Replace RTD Service on Four Lines

RTD service on four bus lines serving Pomona Valley were replaced by private carriers under contract with the County of Los Angeles effective December 28, 1987.

The four lines include 192, 194, 291, and 293.

RTD Board President Jan Hall said the lines are being operated as part of a demonstration program. "With the cooperation of the County, the RTD, and the Los Angeles County Transportation Commission, the replacement is being made with the assurance that the regional bus system will remain intact and that our riders will not experience any interruption in service," she said.

Fares, bus schedules, bus stops, and routes will remain unchanged, and RTD monthly passes, tickets, and tokens will be honored.








February is Black History Month

America's strong foundations were built by men and women whose roots stemmed from cultures from around the world. This month we celebrate the contributions of those of African descent—Black Americans.

Here are thumbnail sketches of some of the Black Americans who have played major roles in the military, politics, education, arts, and many other facets of our culture.

Benjamin Banneker—1731-1806. An astronomer, mathematician, and surveyor, Banneker is chiefly known for his role in conducting the original land survey of the District of Columbia.

Mary McLeod Bethune-1875-1955. Driven by a vision of education that would prepare Black children for work and active citizenship, Bethune built a school out of a shack in Daytona, Florida. Her school later became Bethune-Cookman College. Bethune attained national prominence when she represented President Franklin D. Roosevelt at the United Nations Charter Conference.

George Washington Carver—1864-1943. Trained in botany and agricultural chemistry at Iowa State University, Carver left for the challenges of Tuskegee Institute, a school without a laboratory or greenhouse. There he forged an illustrious career in agricultural education and research, developing a wide variety of products from peanuts and sweet potatoes.

W.E.B. DuBois—
1868-1963. DuBois wrote the first sociological study of Blacks in America and organized the first civil rights protest in this century. A teacher, writer, and educator, DuBois was active in international politics and provided a model in Black intellectual leadership.

W. C. Handy—1873-1958. As "Father of the Blues," he brought this still-evolving music to the attention of the world. Remember his classic "St. Louis Blues"?

Lorraine Hansberry—1930-1965. Her play Raisin in the Sun won the Drama Critics Circle Award in 1959 for its depiction of the generation gap between a religious Southern mother and her son, struggling to succeed in the city.

Langston Hughes—1902-1967. Hughes' poetry captured the pleasures and sorrows of Black life with forthright honesty. His work is still recognized for its contribution to American literature.

Henry Johnson and Needham Roberts were two of nearly 400,000 American Blacks who defended the U.S. during World War I. Both men became heroes by resisting enemy attacks. Both were awarded the prestigious French "Croix de Guerre."

James W. Johnson—1871-1938. A poet, lyricist, and novelist, Johnson was the first Black admitted to the Florida Bar. He served as U.S. Counsel to Venezuela and Nicaragua. For 14 years he was executive secretary of the NAACP.

Jacob Lawrence— 1917. His contemporary paintings have been acclaimed around the world. Many depict major events in Black history.

Alice Walker—Best known for her epistolary novel, *The Color Purple*. She is the prolific author of many novels detailing the Black Feminist experience.

I'm doing these two films as a matched set because they deal with the same geography, the same time period, some of the same subject matter, and both possess some of the same flaws.

The Last Emperor is the story of the last "Lord of Ten Thousand Years," Emperor Poo-Yee, who ascended the throne of China in 1904 at the age of three. It's a film of epic proportions, moving from the Forbidden City to the Peking of Chairman Mao in the 1960's, rich in visual beauty as it portrays a very foreign era that came to an end only in this century. Empire of the Sun tells of one boy's struggle in the China of World War II as

he endures hardship, imprisonment, and the loss of innocence. Too richly detailed to even attempt a summary here, these were the "big movies" of the holiday season, running at 2 hours, 45 minutes apiece.

I enjoyed both films, and highly recommend each as well worth the time, but, as you will note from the ratings, there are a few flaws. One of the chief ones is that, as with all epics. there is a certain distance between the moviegoer and the movie. It's hard to get completely involved with something that's larger than life, because it's sometimes difficult to relate to. With Emperor. the sheer fascination with this completely alien way of life often overcomes that feeling until close to the end, when the film must deal with harsh, petty reality. But then, filmmaker Bernardo Bertolucci pulls out a twist that recaptures the magic once more, bringing back that feeling of awe you feel at the film's beginning.

Empire is a bit more personal, as all of Steven Spielberg's films are, but the subject material escapes him on occasion, and there are several

...continued from page 21 places where the film could have been tightened. But when everything clicks, it is pure magic. It's a transitional film, really. There's still a great deal of humor, and the traditional excitement you've come expect, but Spielberg's outlook, how he sees the story, seems to be shifting. I'm not certain which way he's going, but the feeling of change is there. This should be very interesting.

Time now for our year-end roundup. As I did last year, I do not intend that this list be a Top Ten. I enjoy different movies for different reasons, so it's like comparing apples and oranges. The following are films that instantly rush to mind when preparing this list. If I can remember it without prompting, it was a good movie.

The Untouchables Kevin Costner, Sean
Connery; this is a wonderful film that will
undoubtedly be one of the
top contenders in the
Oscar race this year.

The Living
Daylights - Timothy
Dalton; Bond is back with
a vengeance, with a new
actor giving new life to a
perennial favorite.

The Princess Bride
- Rob Reiner's fairytale is certain to be a classic, enjoyed by generations to come.

Radio Days - Another fine movie from Woody Allen. How does he do that so consistently? Three Men and a
Baby - Tom Selleck, Ted
Danson, Steve Guttenberg; one of the cutest
comedies to come along
the pike in a long time.

Dragnet - Dan Ackroyd, Tom Hanks; a very enjoyable parody of the old TV series.

That's all for this month.




