# WHAT'S "CTSA"?

The Mystery Department Steps Up

new department was created in 1991 in response to the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 — the Consolidated Transportation Service Authority or "CTSA." The ADA provides protection for the disabled against discrimination in employment, housing and transportation. The law aims to ensure equal access for persons with disabilities to public accommodations, public services, telecommunications and transportation.

LACTC's in-house group of five, located on the 9th floor, recently prepared a draft plan of a countywide transportation project that proposes to establish a network of public and private paratransit operators who will provide service to ADA eligible

individuals - without duplicating existing dial-a-ride and other specialized transit services throughout the county.

# ARE WE REALLY READY FOR THE PERS WORKSHOP?

think its safe to say that we're a fairly "young" agency - for a majority of us, retirement seems far off into the future. But recently PERS invited us to attend one of their many scheduled workshops intended to educate members on how the PERS plan works. Looking for ways to inform I.M. readers about employee benefits, I signed up. So on a gray, rainy afternoon, I found myself sitting in the old State Building with about 10 others, who unlike myself were on the very verge of retiring. "Are you in the right room?," asked the moderator. I stammered out an "uuuuuuhhhh" after scanning the group and explained that I was covering the meeting to report back to our employees what to expect from the workshops.


The PERS workshops are a result of a 50% reduction in staff at the state retirement office. Instead of one-on-one counseling sessions for soon-to-be retirees, the group meetings were established.

At the workshop, we each received a meaty packet of information, which was then dissected onto the yellowing wall by an overhead projector. Lots of numerical charts were involved — giving examples of ages combined with service years. Here's what I took notes on (while concentrating very hard on not drifting off into daydreams):

- Attend a workshop at least one year before your planned retirement.
- The minimum retirement age for most PERS members is 50 with five years of PERS "service credit" (years you've worked).
- The amount of your monthly allowance can be affect by three factors:
- Your age. You'll receive extra percentage points quarterly during the golden ages of 50 to 63. At 63 you've maxed out on percentage points.
- 2. Your "service credits."
- 3. Your final compensation/highest average salary.

LACTC is one of four transportation commissions established by the state legislature in Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

LACTC places Proposition A on the ballot. The proposal calls for bus fare reductions, construction of a rail transit system. and other transit projects to be financed by a local half-cent sales tax.

LACTC purchases 16 miles of Southern Pacific right-of-way at a cost of \$25 million for the Metro Blue Line.

In October, LACTC breaks ground for the Metro Blue Line at the site of the maintenance yard in North Long Beach.

A \$492.2-million federal funding agreement for the first 4.4 miles of the Metro Red Line is signed by the Federal Transportation Administration, the City of LA, LACTC and the

- · If you ever leave the PERS plan and cashed out because you've moved on to a new job, you can buy back into the system at a later date if another employer subscribes to PERS. (One attendee said he did this and it was well worth the \$5,000 he paid to get back into the plan.)
- · Ways to build larger benefits: Pick the best date to retire by calculating your quarterly percentage gains based on your birthday; work longer, especially if you're only in your fifties; save sick leave time; and look into temporary annuities.

The packet, with much more detailed information, is available to review before you decide to attend a workshop. Call ext. 6565 to make arrangements. On a final note, the State Building has a very reasonably priced cafeteria — but keep in mind that you get what you pay for.
