Council Votes 9-to-2 to Aid Mini-bus Plan

The Los Angeles City Council approved by a 9-to-2 vote the transfer of \$444,300 of Los Angeles' federal revenue sharing funds to

provide for 60% of the Mini-bus operational costs for another year.

The financial support will make it possible to double the present Mini-bus program and reduce the five-minute route lapse to four minutes. Mini-buses will run on an expanded route serving Occidental Center and the Merchandise and Clothing Mart.

The two dissenting votes were cast by San Fernando Valley Councilmen Ernani Bernardi and Robert M. Wilkinson.

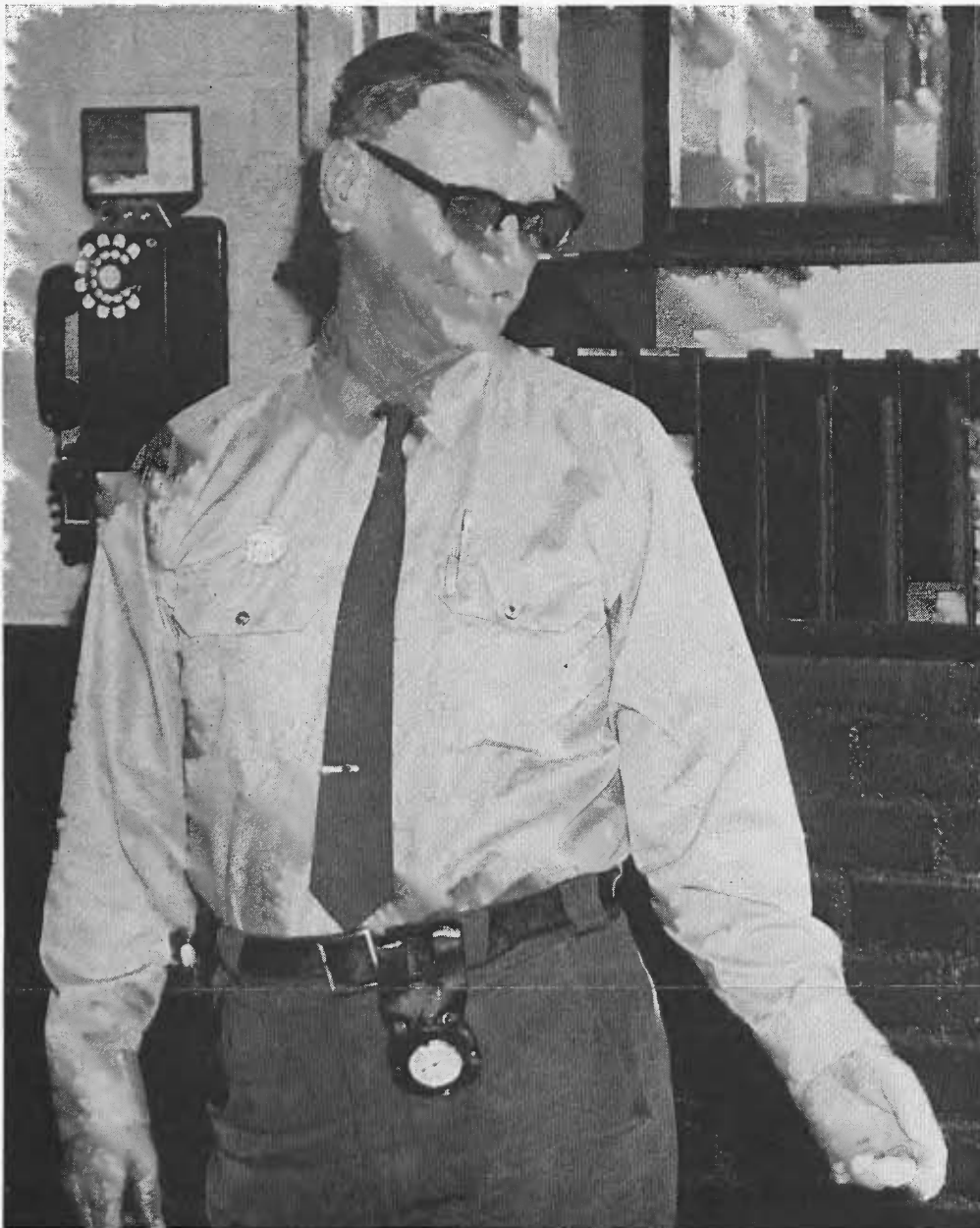

Historic Events

The last regularly-scheduled streetcar pulled in to the Georgia Street Yard shortly after 6 p.m. Sunday, March 31, 1963, late due to special "end-of-an-era" ceremonies.

Actually that V Pico and Georgia car wasn't the last streetcar to cruise Los Angeles streets though. That honor was taken by a "Special" streetcar carrying members of the Electric Railway Historical Association.

The Stops and Zones Department prepared for the transition to total bus transportation by establishing or adjusting 1,000 signs, of which 600 were located within the City of Los Angeles.

The bus which launched the new Metropolitan Transit Authority look was driven by Operator **James C. Patterson**, who resigned in September 1968. He was working the new Line 9 Jefferson to Tenth Avenue route.

"The Mime of Marcel Marceau" — 23-minute color film showing the art of the great French pantomimist on stage and behind the scenes.

"The Monkey and the Organ Grinder" — 11-minute color film of a day in the life of three monkeys and their organ-grinding master.

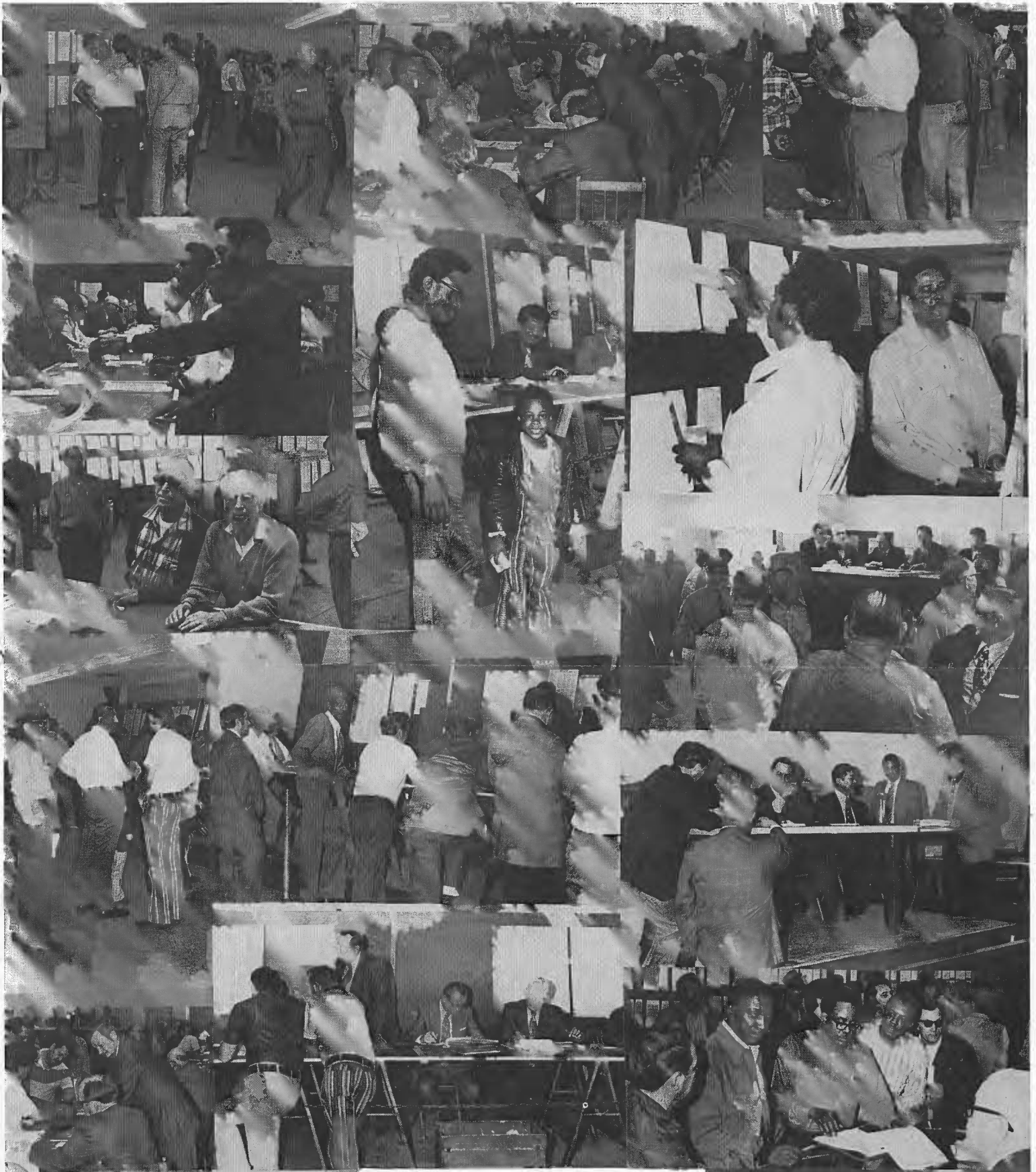

Stars and Stripes Rate Among Oldest Symbols

We live in a country less than 200 years old while flags have been used for some 6,500 years to show nationality and allegiance, yet the basic national United States flag is one of the oldest still flown.

Only the basic flags of six other countries — Austria, Denmark, Great Britain, the Netherlands, Sweden and Switzerland — are older.

In 1777, Congress created the basic design of 13 alternating red and white stripes and 13 white stars in a field of blue representing the 13 colonies which had declared their independence the year before. As the Union grew, one star and one stripe were added for each new state.

By 1817, with the Union now totalling 20 states, it was obvious that this practice would distort the original shape of the flag. Congress decided to return to a flag with one star to represent each state.

When Hawaii was admitted as our 50th state in 1959, the flag was changed for the 26th time.

There are many government flags flown in the United States in addition to the national flag. Among them are the president's and vice-president's flags and those of the federal departments and some federal agencies. Each state in the Union has an official flag, as do many cities.

New Tax Laws May Help Moms

Working mothers are qualified to deduct up to \$400 per month in child care expenses, in certain cases, under tax regulations.

Mothers whose adjusted gross income is \$18,000 or less and whose child is under 15 years of age may deduct any child care related costs.

Child care outside home entitles mothers to a \$200 deduction for one child; \$300 for two and \$400 for three or more. In-home care up to \$400 may be allowed through deduction.

If the mother is single, widowed, divorced or separated, she may qualify as the head of the household, but if she is married she must file a joint return with her husband to qualify for the deduction.
