Senior Citizen Fares To Be 10 cents Throughout District Effective June 1

A reduction in senior citizen basic fares from 20 cents to 10 cents has been approved by RTD's Board of Directors. Additional zone charges and transfer fees were not changed.

To become effective June 1, the reduced fare will be available from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and after 7 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and all day on Saturdays, Sundays and on holidays. Previously, Saturday use was restricted to the same hours

The action followed a public hearing on May 3, at which the RTD directors heard a number of individual senior citizens and representatives of senior citizen groups plead for lower

"We are very much aware of the special problems of senior citizens," declared RTD president Norman Topping. "This was one of the first areas in the country to provide reduced fares, which were first offered here in 1961. When our regular fare was increased to its present 30 cents in 1967, the special 20 cents senior citizen fare was not changed.

"We feel that we have been responsive to the needs of this group of citizens, and that the new fare reduction will enable more of them to use the bus more often."

People-Mover For Downtown L.A. Proposed

On April 24 the District informed the Urban Mass Transportation Administration (UMTA) that the District intends to file a formal application for a demonstration grant to provide funds for the design and construction of a secondary distribution (peoplemover) system to be constructed in downtown Los Angeles.

"An improved means of circulation in the Los Angeles Central Business District has been recognized as a necessity for a number of years," noted Jack R. Gilstrap, RTD's general manager. "This secondary distribution system has full support of the City of Los Angeles, its Community Redevelopment Agency and the RTD."

Bus Service For Newhall-Saugus-Valencia In July

Responding to requests from organizations and residents of the growing area, RTD's Board of Directors installed local inner-valley service to commence in mid-July on a six-month experimental basis.

The new routes are designed to serve the area's major residential, commercial, educational and recreational focal points.

Route A (Valencia-Newhall Friendly - Valley Service) will commence at the intersection of Lyons Avenue and Wiley Canyon Road, continuing along Lyons Avenue, Newhall Avenue, Market Street (Newhall), San Fernando Road, Magic Mountain Parkway (Saugus), to Valencia Boulevard. Then along Soledad Canyon Road to Solemint Junction. From this

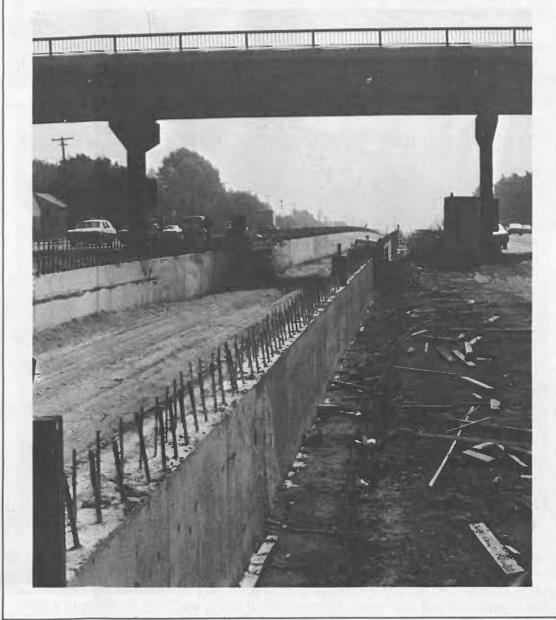


Concrete Barriers Go Up In Busway Median; Designed To Keep Vehicles Off SP Tracks

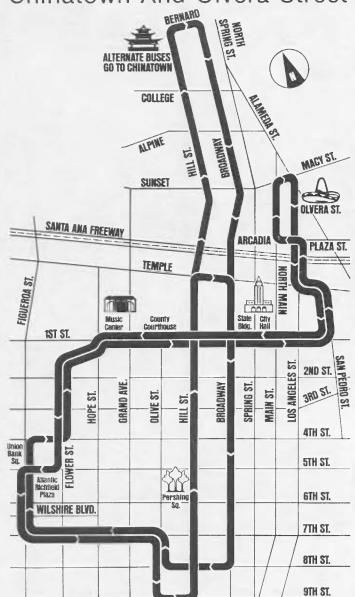

would comprise 1.7 miles of double guideways with four stations. Estimated cost of the people-mover is figured to be between \$35 and \$40 million.

"It will have the capability," Gilstrap continued, "for expansion to serve as the basic distribution network for the Central City portion of Los Angeles, and will complement the trunk-line rapid transit system now in final planning stages.

"The system," Gilstrap concluded, "will embrace, in first phase development, a 4,000-car satellite parking structure in the vicinity of Second Street and Glendale Boulevard, then progress easterly to the main Bunker Hill Station on Grand Avenue between Third and Fourth Streets, continuing easterly to an eastern parking structure accommodating approximately 7,500 cars and on to a station in the vicinity of Boyd and San Pedro Streets.'

Newhall Service

point buses will operate along Sierra Highway (Highway 14) and Friendly Valley Parkway to a terminal zone at Avenue of the Oaks (Friendly Valley).

Route B (Newhall-Saugus - Valencia - College of the Canyons-California Institute of the Arts) will commence at a downtown Newhall terminus at Market Street and San Fernando Road, operating west along Market Street, Newhall Avenue, Lyons Avenue, and Golden State Freeway, turning off to serve California Institute of the Arts at McBean Parkway. Service then will operate via Golden State Freeway, Valencia Boulevard, serving the College of the Canyons, then to the new Civic Center development, Magic Mountain Parkway and San Fernando Road to the point of the beginning.

Reverse service of these loops will be operated.

Proposed schedules provide for an eighty-minute frequency on weekdays between the Valencia - Newhall-Friendly Valley routing over a spread of service from 8 a.m. to 5:16 p.m. The same frequency will apply on the Newhall - Saugus - Valencia-College of the Canyons - California Institute of the Arts routing, between 7:20 a.m. and 5:49 p.m.

Only the Valencia-New-hall-Friendly Valley route will be operated on Saturdays, on a frequency of eighty minutes between the hours of 9:13 a.m. and 5:15 p.m.

No service will be operated on Sundays or national holidays

The District officials also voted to consider elimination of the special \$9 monthly pass for senior citizens at its next meeting.

Their action came following a public hearing of a proposed District budget for the 1972-73 fiscal year.

The hearing was conducted as a result of a change in the agency's fiscal year from a calendar basis to a July 1 — June 31 schedule, which conforms to most governmental agencies.

The \$107,165,000 budget presented today compares to a \$93,640,000 budget adopted by the RTD Board of Directors last December for the current calendar year.

The new budget provides for \$72,920,000 in operating expense, capital expenditures of \$24,655,000, debt service costs of \$3,090,000, and a set aside of \$7,500,000 for rapid transit development. "The new budget reflects some previously unanticipated increases in the cost of our retirement program and in other operating costs,' explained RTD General Manager Jack R. Gilstrap. "At the same time, it includes some items previously scheduled for 1973.

"We have also increased our capital budget for the year, reflecting changes in our five-year capital improvement program which will provide us with more than 200 new buses, as well as accomplishing much-needed repairs and renovation in some of our operating divisions."

No additional changes in fare structure are reflected in the budget, Gilstrap emphasized.

"Our projected revenues are fundamentally the same as we would have projected at the first of the year," he said. "This includes annual passenger or farebox revenues of approximately \$47,900,000, tax revenues of approximately \$39,000,000 including funds still being derived from the special 1970 sales tax levy, federal grants of some \$17,307,000 and subsidies, advertising revenues interest earnings, and other revenues, totaling \$2,958,000.

withstand the force of a fast moving vehicle crashing into them.

Busway lanes, 17 feet wide, will parallel the barriers. The east lane, soon to be under construction, will be built (see bottom photograph, page 1) alongside the right hand barrier and the far right overpass support. Because of the 17-foot width of the Busway the supports on the overpass and the walkway (top photo) will have to be relocated within the barrier wall.

A line of brightly colored rubber pylons will be placed in the area about in line with the right support pillar. These pylons will separate the Busway lane from a 10-foot shoulder which will be constructed between the Busway lane and the number one lane of the freeway and which will serve as an emergency parking area for Busway buses and freeway vehicles.

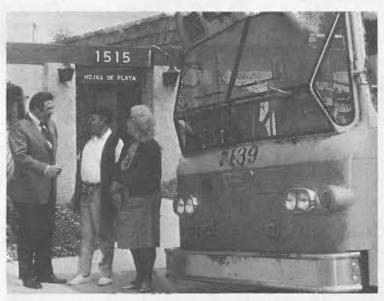
