GUIDE DOG INSTRUCTORS TO TEACH THEIR 'STUDENTS'
ABOUT TRAIN ETIQUETTE ABOARD METRO BLUE LINE

WHAT:

Approximately 10 guide dogs-in-training, a mix of German

Shepherds, Labrador and Golden Retrievers ranging in age from 6

to 16 months old, including puppies, will be taught by 20 representatives of the South Bay Guide Dog Raisers Club, a delegation comprised of both adults and children, on how use the train for the first time. Following two years of training, the canines are then assigned to sight-impaired clients who use transit on a daily basis. The Metro Blue Line outing, paid for by the MTA, is intended to expose the green and white jacket clad dogs to real-life situations that can be encountered while using mass transit and to become familiar with the surroundings. MTA officials will greet the human being/canine entourage and explain the ins-and-outs of train travel to their captive audience. Guests also will receive MTA

goodie bags.
