MTA TO HOLD PUBLIC WORKSHOP IN SOUTH CENTRAL L.A. APRIL 4 TO REVIEW LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

MTA will hold a public workshop in South Central Los Angeles Wednesday, April 4, to discuss its draft Long Range Transportation Plan, a 25-year blueprint for transportation planning in Los Angeles County through the year 2025. The meeting will start at 2:30 p.m. in the plaza level of First AME Church, 2270 S. Harvard Blvd.

Anyone concerned about worsening traffic as Los Angeles County grows in population is encouraged to attend and learn about MTA's plan to keep local streets and highways moving freely. Spanish language translators will be available at the meeting.
